Belleville Collections. The customs returns for the port of Belleville for February shows a considerable increase over the corresponding month last year. Figures for the two months are as follows: February, 1926, \$195,389.62; February, 1925, \$178,888.60; increase, 1926, \$24,503.02.

Won Debating Prize. It has been announced that David Walker, Toronto, has won the Bristol prize at Toronto University for debating and public speaking. Mr. Walker is a second-year arts student at 'Varsity, with whose debating team he appeared in Kingston a week ago in the contest with Queen's, which his team won. He is a grandson of the late Benjamin W. Robertson of this city, and a nephew of Ex-Ald. Herbert N. Robertson, Wellington street.

Had Fine Trip. Mr. C. G. Shannon, assistant postmaster, who with a party of Kingston people sailed from New York on February 9th, has written to Postmaster Stewart from Southampton, telling of the voyage across. He wishes to inform his Kingston friends that all the party are well, and enjoyed the trip immensely. The party, according to schedule were in Athens, Greece, on Thursday when Mr. Stewart received the letter.

Civic Charities. At a meeting of the Civic Charities Committee held on Wednesday afternoon, the chairman, Ald. T. A. Kidd, was asked to report on all the wards in the homes, and present his report at the next meeting of the committee. A communication was received from the Kiwanis Club, asking that a federated charities be formed in Kingston, but the matter was laid over.

Woodlots are Depleted. At a recent meeting of the Prince Edward County Agricultural Advisory Council it was pointed out that at the rate local woodlots and swamps were being depleted the time was not far distant when the wood supply of Prince Edward would be entirely exhausted. It was recommended that the County Council meet with the Advisory Agricultural Council to discuss the matter with a view to putting into effect some reforestation principles toward the establishment of a new supply. It is probable that an outside speaker will visit the county and discuss the matter in the near future.

Mrs. Hannah Freeman. The funeral of the late Mrs. Hannah Jane Freeman, an aged resident of Harrowsmith, took place on Wednesday afternoon, from her daughter's residence, corner of Raglan Road and Barrie street. The service in the home was conducted by Rev. W. H. Raney, and the remains were taken to Harrowsmith on the C.P.R. train. The service at Harrowsmith was conducted by Rev. A. S. Doggett, of that place. The pallbearers were seven nephews, Samuel Babcock, Robert Babcock, George Babcock, William Babcock, Benjamin Babcock, and Wtlier Babcock. The funeral was largely attended by friends of the deceased, and the floral offerings were numerous.

No Word Yet Received. Dr. McNeill, registrar at Queen's University, has not as yet received any official notice regarding the proposal of the Ontario Government to have first-year university work in the high schools and collegiate institutes.

Dr. McNeill intimated that in the event of this happening, the university would suffer quite a loss in fees of the first year students, who number 123. The fees are \$70 a session. It was proposed to have a conference of all the university representatives in Ontario after each university has separately considered the proposed change.

Macdonald School Club. The monthly meeting of Macdonald Home and School Club was held on Tuesday in the Assembly Hall. Mrs. Lowing, the president took the chair. Mrs. Donnelly and Mrs. Hall reported favorably on the welfare work which had been under their charge during the winter months. The president then introduced to the members and friends present, Mrs. Woodsworth, returned missionary from Kobe, Japan, who gave a most interesting talk on her work among the Japanese, illustrated by lantern slides. The description given left a deep impression upon the minds of those present. It was a most instructive and interesting address the social committee under Mrs. Lawler served refreshments. Miss Tullock sang two vocal solos accompanied by Vera Lowing.

NEVER ASKED FOR CHURCH PROPERTY

Sunbury Unionists Moved Out Last June and Worshipped With Methodists.

Rev. J. F. Carleton, pastor of the Battersea and Sunbury United churches, informs The Whig that the Unionist minority of Sunbury were granted by the Ontario Property Commission just what they asked, and the Unionists were perfectly satisfied. Never once was the church property under consideration at the sitting in Belleville, and the Unionists had no desire to obtain the property. They simply moved out on the 10th of June last and worshipped in the old Methodist church where the United Church is still carrying on.

The statement published in The Whig with regard to the Sunbury case at Belleville was what appeared in a Belleville newspaper, which evidently got things mixed.

INTERCOLLEGIATE DEBATE.

Between Queen's and Guelph Agricultural College. Arrangements have been made for a debate at Queen's to-night between Queen's and the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph.

J. S. Findley and D. A. Skelton will debate for Queen's at home, while Blythe Taylor and Hugo T. Ewart debate tonight at Loyola College. The subject will be "Proportional Representation for Canada." The judges will be Rev. T. W. Savary, Mr. E. O. Sitter, Principal of the Collegiate Institute, Mr. Stewart, American Consul General at Large, Washington, D.C., who happens to be in Kingston to-night.

In the intercollegiate series there are now three triangular teams: Queen's, Toronto, McGill; Western, McMaster, Ontario Agricultural College; Ottawa, Loyola, Bishop's. In the first round the winners in each group were Queen's, Ontario Agricultural College, and Loyola. These three institutions debate to-night for the championship.

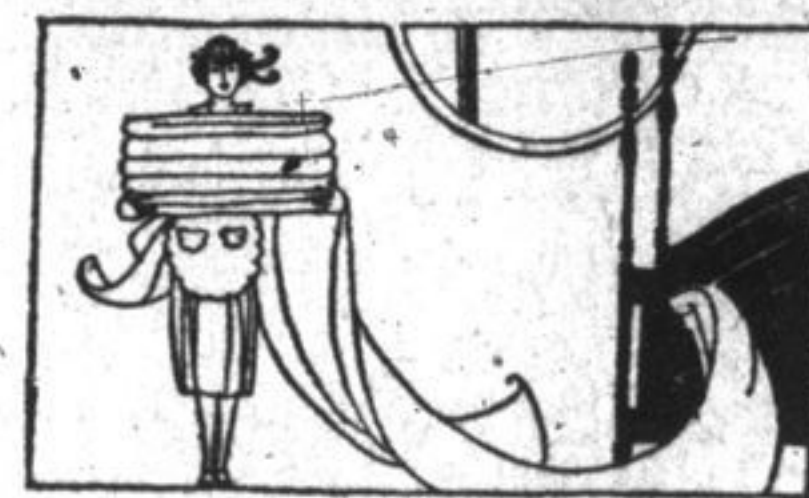
