GEN. HILL'S PLEA FOR CANADIANISM

Protests Against the Influence Exerted on Canada by the United States.

A plea for sturdy Canadianism was voiced by Brig.-General F. W. Hill, speaking at the regular meeting of the Rotary Club on Thursday. General Hill protested against the conscious and unconscious influence which was being exerted on Canada by the United States and he regretted that in England everyone from this continent is known as an American and no distinction is made by the general public between residents of Canada and of the United States.

The speaker said that he knew and liked the American people and that the example set by Canada and the United States for friendliness was a great factor in the peace of the world, but at the same time he could not help feeling that the American people liked what the Canadians possessed better than the Canadians themselves.

He instanced how Canadians followed the American spelling of words rather than sticking to the form current in England, and he declared that the Americans were trying to stamp the English language with something of their own. American magazines and publications were doing much to unconsciously influence opinion in Canada and he urged Canadians to withstand this. The motion picture produced in the United States but exhibited in Canada was also mentioned as a factor in the spread of the American propaganda.

General Hill urged his auditors to stick to the old traditions rather than adopt everything new, for he said the traditions of their forefathers were founded on industry, honesty and politeness while everything to-day was founded on efficiency with a capital "E" and a square jaw.

In concluding General Hill spoke of the National Defence Force and declared that it would be as logical to do away with the police force as it would be to abolish the Canadian National Defence Force. Such a force did not mean that Canada was looking for trouble, he said, but it gave her a national consciousness. Canadians did not wish to hide behind someone else, for if they did they were not worthy of their sons who died overseas.

Rotarian A. D. McConnell moved a vote of thanks to General Hill, and Rotarian A. N. Lyster seconded it. Mr. Lyster regretted that owing to the predominance of American publications it had not as yet proved practical to establish a really Canadian national magazine that would be worthy of the country.

On motion of Rotarians Louis Best and Claude Gordon the club supported the nomination of the Utica Club of "Bill" Campbell, past-president of the Rochester Club, as district governor.

WHIG GAVE HOCKEY STORY ON THE PHONE

Intense Interest Was Taken in Kingston and District Over the Junior Game.

The Whig telephones were kept buzzing last night as a result of the big hockey match in Toronto, between Kingston and Owen Sound, for the Junior O.H.A. honors. The Whig had three telephones in service, giving out particulars of the game, and that the fans were interested in the big struggle was shown by the number of calls received from the start of the game till the finish. A large crowd also gathered in the Whig office, and had the benefit of the bulletins received from the Toronto Arena during the progress of the match.

The news of the victory was received with great rejoicing by the fans, who were unable to go to Toronto to see the final match. That the interest was not only confined to Kingston, was manifested by the many long distance calls received by the Whig during the night from various outside points.

"Well done, Kingston," was the general slogan following the final score, and the juniors well deserved all the praise that was bestowed on them for winning the honors, for it is fifteen years since Kingston, the city that originated hockey, won the junior championship.

RATE ONE MILL FOR GARBAGE COLLECTION

Civic Health Committee Recommends the Same Rate as Last Year.

The Civic Health Committee recommends that the rate for the collection and disposal of the city's garbage remain the same this year as last year, and the year before, namely a rate of one mill on the dollar.

This was decided at a meeting of the Health Committee held on Thursday afternoon, and the recommendation will be to the finance committee for consideration in the striking of the budget, and there is no likelihood of any change being made in this rate, as it is regarded as a fixture. The chairman, Ald. Driscoll presided, and also present were Ald. Bennett and Sanitary Inspector Eugene Sleeth.

The report of the Sanitary Inspector showed that during the month of February, there were 350 loads of garbage collected, and disposed of at the incinerator, or an average of about fifteen loads per day. This was about the same as for February of last year.

Owing to many complaints received about the collection of the garbage, it was decided to ask Contractor McKendry to appoint a foreman on the job, in order that the collection will be placed on a better system. At the present time there is no head to the staff, with the result the system is not what it should be, in the opinion of the committee. Mr. McKendry will be asked to appoint a foreman or attend to this work himself.

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
