RATE ONE MILL FOR GARBAGE COLLECTION

Civic f'ealth Committee Recommends the Same Rate as Last Year.

The Civic Health Committee recommends that the rate for the collection and disposal of the city's garbage remain the same this years as last year, and the year before, namely a rate of one mill on the dol-

This was decided at a meeting of the Health Committee held on Thursday afternoon, and the recommendation will go on to the finance committee for consideration in the striking of the budget, and there is no likelihood of any change being made in this rate, as it is regarded as a fixture. The chairman, Ald. Driscoll presided, and also present were Ald. Bennett and Sanitary In-

spector Eugene Sleeth. The report of the Sanitary Inspector showed that during the month of February, there were 350 loads of garbage collected, and disposed of at the incinerator, or an average of about fiften loads day. This was about the same as for February of last year.

Owing to many complaints received about the collection of the gar-bage, it was decided to ask Contractor McKendry to appoint a foreman on the job, in order that the collection will be placed on a better system. At the present time there is no head to the staff, with the result the the system is not what it should in the opinion of the committee.
