Evangelist Chapman Answers Some Questions at the Alfred Street Church.

Evangelist Chapman spent an hour last evening, at the new church on Alfred street, answering questions, one of which was:

"Does it make any difference which day we keep as long as we keep one day holy?"

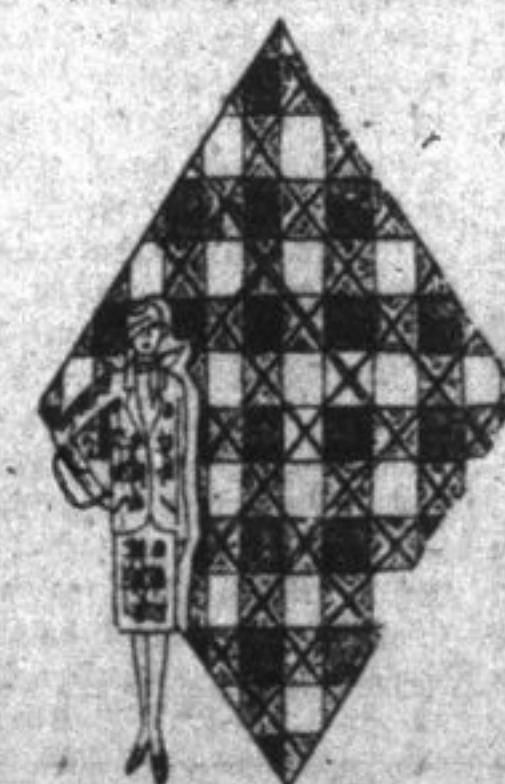
