The Act proposes a plan whereby he may be treated. not as a criminal or one legally charged with crime, but as a ward of the state, to receive practically the care, custody and discipline that are accorded to the child and approximates as nearly as may be, that which should be given, by its parents. In order to put in force a Juvenile Court plan it is absolutely necessary to have a probation system. The probation is the very essence of the Juvenile Court's claim to rehabilitation of the juvenile delinguent. It is the method by which the community through its courts seek to discipline, supervise and reform offenders against society without imprisoning them. The task of the probation is to make an investigation of the individual in his own environment with a view to ascertaining the causes of his anti-social conduct and in the light of these, to re-adjust him in society. It may be, of course, that the environment needs re-adjustment. "One should not send a thief back to a den thieves." To put the offender in custody on the other hand is to isolate him in an artificial environment where his relations with society will be temporarily but completely severed. A "prison cure" is no assurance


