"Why does a person seek pleasure? Because he believes in it. A person is a Christian because he believes in it. He has no time to turn to evil ways. Love lifts you above all these things, and makes the way easy. Keep on believing." "We have a right to expect a great blessing," said Dr. Chown, in his closing remarks.

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POST OFFICE BULLETIN.

Regarding Postal Service Into Red Lake Mining District. The Post Office, Bulletin contains the following very interesting information in regard to the postal service into the new Red Lake Mining District.

"Permission has been granted to the Jack Elliott Air Service operating a daily aerial service between Hudson Station on the C.N.R. and the Red Lake Mining District, to convey such mail as is offered for conveyance. The air service and its senders assume all risk. The following are some of the instructions issued to the public who send mail to Red Lake:

(1) "By Air Mail" to be written prominently on the address side of the envelope.

(2) Usual Canadian postage stamp on address side.

(3) Special aerial stamp sold by the company and its agents for a charge of 25c to be placed on the reverse side, in payment of the aerial charge for transmission by aerial service, which has been fixed by them making the flight.
