In opening his sermon, he pointed out the three important visions of Christ, namely, service, spiritual power, and righteousness. He enumerated many cases where great men had declared the teachings of Christ to be above improvement. Christ had been well trained before he had entered on his ministry, being thirty years of age before he preached his first sermon. "I hear some times that you can improve the teachings of great men, but I never heard of how you can improve the teachings of Christ" said the speaker, who declared that the teachings were even more adaptable now than when they
