



Cattle Shipments Up.

Chicks in large broods require extremely careful attention to prevent crowding and to see that the smaller and weaker members have a chance Even on large poultry farms with experienced help there are few individual flocks of more than 500, and generally 300 do better. There are certain precautions to be observed in handling the brooder. American fresh spot quotations boxes may warp badly, so that it is best to bind them with a few strands of wire to hold them firm. Several can be set in a sunny window together and turned daily to keep the seedlings

growing straight. In preparing the box arrange for Household\$4.50 drainage by placing broken flower pots or crockery over the holes, or fitting a piece of burlap to the bottom of the box. 
