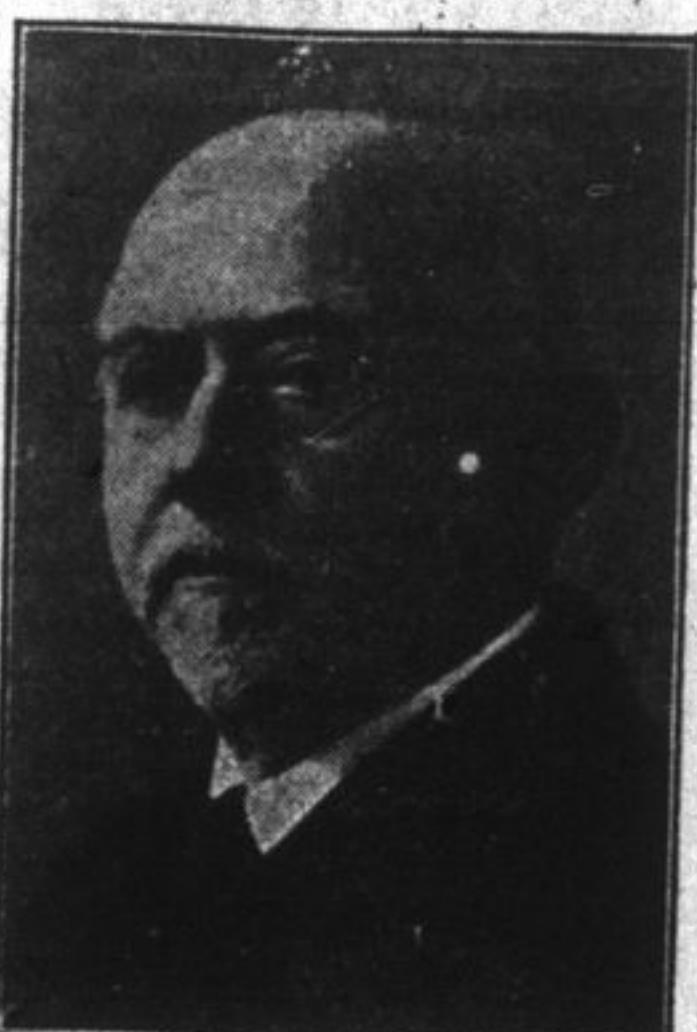

"Stop Signs" in Hamilton.
 Sir:—Your report of the council meeting on March 9th last states that the "Stop Sign" for Princess street as recommended by the Board of Works was referred back. One Alderman is reported as saying that he understood Hamilton had one street under such a by-law and that a great many of the people regarded it as a nuisance and uncalled for. For the information of the alderman and public the facts are that four principal streets in that city have "Stop Signs," namely James, King, Main and Cameron streets. Last year I motored through Hamilton streets many times before and after the operation of the by-law and it was stated by police officials, motorists, the press and public generally that motor accidents had been reduced fifty per cent since the "Stop Sign" by-law had gone into effect. As to having an extra policeman on every corner that is probably intended as a joke. It does not seem reasonable that any motorist would take the chances of breaking a by-law and being fined especially when he knew that through his endeavors many accidents would be prevented in a city where it is conceded there is much reckless driving. Many cities and towns throughout the province have successfully adopted this means of safety and the latest to follow is the town of Napawan with the "Stop Sign" by-law governing its main street which press reports state is proving satisfactory.
