DR. W. H. MILSAP OF NAPANEE DEAD

Passing of Arthur T. Chinneck in Toronto—D. H. Preston, K.O., is Very Ill.

Napanee, March 15.—It was with great shock on Saturday morning that Napanee learned of the death of one of her most esteemed citizens in the person of Dr. W. H. Milsap, a practicing dentist in Napanee for over twenty years. Dr. Milsap was in his office on Wednesday and apparently enjoyed perfect health, but was stricken with a heart attack early Thursday morning. Dr. J. E. Willoughby was called and considered the patient's condition grave, and Dr. Howard of Kingston, a friend of the family, was also called, and the two medical men were in attendance until the end on Saturday morning.

Dr. Milsap had a large practice and was a friend to everyone. He was one of a family of nine children of the late Hicks Milsap and his wife Mary McGill of Moscow. He was born at the family homestead in February, 1875. He received his education at Newburgh High School and at Napanee Collegiate Institute. For six years he taught school and then took a course in dentistry at the Royal College of Dental Surgeons, Toronto, where he graduated in 1903. After graduation he opened an office in Napanee and by his skill, perseverance and pleasing manner he acquired a very large practice.

He is survived by his wife, who was Blanche Williams, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Williams of Etobicoke, and three children, William aged twelve years, Douglas aged eight, and Mary aged two years. The brothers and sisters who survive him are Mrs. William Gee, Victoria, B.C.; Mrs. James Lochhead, Lansdowne; Mrs. F. Key and Mrs. Fred Chme, Moscow; Marshall, at Colebrook; John and Nell at Moscow.

Dr. Milsap was a member of the School Board, of the Chamber of Commerce, of Trinity United Church, of the Masonic Order, and of the Canadian Order of Foresters. He was a staunch Conservative in politics. The funeral takes place on Monday from Trinity church at 2.30 p.m. Interment at Riverside cemetery.

Word was received in Napanee on Sunday evening of the death in Toronto of Arthur T. Chinneck, a well known resident of Napanee. Deceased had been in the Oddfellows' Home in Toronto for the past four or five years. Two sisters are left to mourn. The remains will be brought to Napanee on Tuesday to await burial later.
