Inducted as Pastor of United Church, Bristol, Que.

The Ottawa Journal of Monday says: Rev. D. T. Lancaster, formerly of Pittsburg, was inducted as pastor of St. Andrew's United Church, Bristol, Que., at a congregational meeting on Friday evening in the church. There was a large representation of the congregation, and neighboring ministers.

The service was in charge of Rev. M. C. Platt, chairman of the Ottawa Presbytery of the United Church. The ladies of the church arranged supper at seven o'clock, and the induction followed at eight o'clock. Rev. G. A. McDonald, of Calvin Church, cited the steps taken by the congregation, and offered wholesome advice to the people of the church. Rev. F. S. Milliken of St. Andrew's Church gave the sermon, and Rev. H. I. Horsey, of Zion Church, addressed the minister.

A hearty vote of thanks and appreciation was given Rev. G. A. McDonald for his efficient services as Interim Moderator of the congregation. There were several nearby congregations represented, including Shawville, Brasidas and Knox Churches.

Mr. Lancaster formerly was pastor of Pittsburg, in the presbytery of Kingston.

PROF. ARKLEY TO FIND POWER COST

(Continued from Page 1.) to be without the street railway would be like putting Kingston back to a village.

"We are here as trustees of the people, and it is our duty to do the best we can for the city as a whole," he said. "And we should do the best we can for the street railway, to keep the road going. This is the policy I have had all the way through."

"We do not want to get power at less than cost," said Mr. Nickle, "and we are not asking for any bonus."

"I am sure every citizen is back of the proposition to help the street railway and keep the road open," remarked Mayor Angrave.

Mr. Nickle stated that he considered the Kingston street railway had accomplished a great deal, in keeping in operation, when so many roads had failed, and he took occasion to refer to three roads operated by the Hydro which had failed.

Chairman McFarlane informed Mr. Nickle that the matter of arriving at the cost of power for the street railway company would be taken up at the earliest possible moment.

Rates for Electricity.

Commissioner Halliday asked if any action had been taken as yet, regarding making a reduction in the rates for electricity as had been decided on by the Commission, in view of the surplus reported in this department.

Chairman McFarlane stated that this matter should be left over until the agreement had been reached with the Hydro.

Commissioner Halliday stated that he would not agree to any change being made in the present contract.

Commissioner Halliday also wanted to know why the commercial rate should be higher than the domestic rate.

Manager Folger stated that it had always been the policy of the late Sir Adam Beck to give the cheaper rate to the masses, and let the stores pay more.

Commissioner Halliday remarked that the Commission would not have a surplus in the electrical department if the rates were reduced.

Other Business Discussed.

The commission received a letter from Prof. Neish, of Queen's University, in which he made an offer to act as consulting engineer for the commission, but no action was taken.

Manager Folger brought up the matter of publicity for the gas department. Some time ago the Commission decided not to sell any more stoves, but merchants had agreed to have the Commission demonstrate the various makes of stoves and then announce to the purchaser, the name of the local merchant handling the stove.

The members of the Commission felt that any demonstration to be given should be put on in the stores, so no action was taken.

The question of the purchase of a gas oven for demonstration purposes was brought to the attention of the members by Manager Folger, and on motion of Commissioner Halliday, it was decided to purchase one. A local hotel and a cafe have expressed a desire to install one. The installation of these ovens means an increase in the sale of gas, and is regarded as good business on the part of the Commission.

In order to help along the fair, the commission made a reduction in the account for the exhibition held last September. The account amounted to \$383.20, and the Commission cut it down to \$290.

Manager Folger was asked to report on a question for an electric light on Frontenac street, between Johnson and Brock streets.

The contract for a supply of manholes was awarded to T. G. Bishop.

It was decided to go ahead with some necessary repairs to the water-works wharf.

The chairman, R. N. F. McFarlane, presided at the meeting, and the other members present were Mayor Angrave and Commissioners James Halliday and James Harris.

RADIO RECEPTION REPORTED BETTER

Due to Active Work by Inspector F. J. C. Dunn and G. O. Folger.

"Tune into a good radio programme tonight," is the admonition of radio experts, who declare that radio reception has a seventy-five per cent. turn for the better. Long distance stations can now be heard with ease and the close stations in Toronto and Montreal can be heard as clear as a bell. Fans who have been worrying about the bad reception all winter and have looked gloomily at expensive radio sets purchased during the boom are beginning to get them out and enjoy some real music. Another notable feature about the "radio revival" is that reception during the day time is almost as good as at night and one enthusiast remarked that if housewives would listen to the cooking lessons and some lectures which are on the air all day it would be worth their while.

Aside from the intellectual aspect of radio reception during the day time it may be remarked that it will help to pass away many gloomy hours.

This remarkable turn for the better is the condition of "Old Man Ether," is due in no small part to the active work of Kingston's radio inspector, F. J. C. Dunn, who with the co-operation of Mr. C. C. Folger, superintendent of the Kingston Public Utilities, was able on Sunday morning to cut off the power on both Clarence and Brock streets and to locate two transformers which were emitting an annoying buzz.
