**A Sale of Farms.**

**Took It Over The Lee.**  
W. A. Davern has purchased one of the cottages which occupied a position in French's park, Melville. On Saturday, Mr. Davern, with two teams of horses succeeded in removing the cottage across the frozen expanse of Consecration Lake to his own secluded, cedar-clusted shore, where it will make an ideal resort for the summer tourist.

**Smith's Falls Seizure.**  
Two gallons of pure alcohol and a leather travelling bag was the prize that rewarded the efforts of Chief Phillips while he was searching a Smith's Falls garage for liquor. The chief suspected that a quantity of liquid goods had been concealed in the building so conducted a search and soon confirmed his suspicions. Behind a stack of tires he discovered the club bag which yielded two gallons of unadulterated alcohol. He seized liquor and bag forthwith.

**Domestic Science Classes.**  
Classes in domestic training arranged by the Y.W.C.A. began on Wednesday, and judging by the attendance they will prove popular. The course is intended for girls about to leave school to enter domestic service, but all girls wishing to learn housekeeping are welcomed. Sweeping, dusting, sewing, waiting on table and the care of small children will be taken up. Miss B. Wilson, school nurse, and Mrs. John Delaney, a graduate of Macdonald College, Guelph, have given their advice in arranging the course.

**Egerton Switzer Passes.**  
Egerton Switzer passed away very suddenly at Picton, on Sunday as the result of a heart attack. He was born seventy-nine years ago at Switzer's, but had spent the biggest part of his life in Prince Edward County. He was one of the pioneer cheesemakers, at Cherry Valley as a young man, at Oshawa and at the Bloomfield factory where he made cheese for many years. He also owned a farm at Bloomfield which he sold to Col. Lighthall later, the farm which George Sheriff now owns. He followed the market gar-

dening business in the state of Michigan for a time, finally coming to Picton to reside. He had spent the last several winters in Florida, returning from there only last fall. The deceased is survived by his wife whose maiden name was Ada Williams, a daughter, Mrs. R. M. Kelly, Oshawa, and two sons, Ken Switzer, also of Oshawa and Ed. Switzer who is now living in Austria.

**Churches Must Secure Permits.**  
Inspector Hill of the Amusement Tax Department announces that in future all churches that intend holding an entertainment must make an application to the Department at Toronto ten days prior to the date of the intended entertainment. He gives as the reason that many churches have been evading the law by paying artists and other talent who have helped on the programme. This is a contravention of the law.

**Menzie-Humble Wedding.**  
A pretty wedding was solemnized at Athens, on Tuesday last, when Miss Mildred Humble, adopted daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mabel Stevens, Plum Hollow and Ernest Menzie Chantry, were united in marriage. The bride, prettily attired in a travelling dress of pine grove poplin, was attended by Miss Cora Kelsey, while Mr. Elmer Jones assisted the groom. Later a sumptuous wedding supper was served at the home of the bride's foster-parents, Mr. and Mrs. Menzie will reside at Chantry.

**A Settlement Was Made.**  
At the Brockville assizes the case of William Wing and his son, Clarence Wing, of Augusta, against the defendant McDonald for injuries received by Clarence Wing while working around a sawing machine the property of the defendant was heard. The injuries were the result of the fly wheel on the machine breaking and pieces of iron striking the plaintiff, Clarence Wing. Following the accident, he was obliged to seek hospital treatment in Montreal. A conference between counsel took place and as a result it was agreed that a consent judgment for the plaintiffs for \$100, without costs, be entered on the records, which was done.

**Old Fashioned Irish Party.**  
A real old fashioned Irish party was held by the Catholic Women's League of Portsmouth, Wednesday evening, and it was one of the most successful entertainments sponsored by the League. Over two hundred couples were present, many appearing in old time costumes of the Irish people. The hall was gaily decorated with green ribbons and gave the scene a real Irish affect. Mrs. P. Bosprey, president of the Portsmouth Catholic Women's League was the convener and she was assisted by the other members. An orchestra was in attendance and rendered many old time pieces during the evening.
