

ANGRY PROTEST BY CUSTOMS INSPECTOR

R. P. Clerk Challenges Stevens -Resents Dirt Being Thown at Him.

Ottawa, March 19-Shaking with rage and in a voice stifled by the fury he could ill repress, Robert P. Clerk, inspector of Customs and Excise at Montreal, this afternoon astounded the customs probe by accusing the Hon. H. H. Stevens of "throwing dirt in the face of an honest man," and daring him to repeat outside of the House of Commons the accusations he made in the speech which caused the parliamentary investigation.

While the Conservative M.P. for Vancouver sat mute and motionless in the committee room, the outraged Mr. Clerk protested that he had been unjustly accused of being a thief, a tool in the hands of politicans, and an incompetent officer. If only he could get the Hon. Mr. Stevens beyond the pale of privilege surrounding the green carpeted floor of the Commons, Mr. Clark intimated he would throw the matter into the courts and "give him something else than a rod to fish with." He even appealed to the committee for aid in his "humble petition," but all that the witness got was a statement from Paul Mercier, the chairman, that he would have British

The last sizzling moments of the session capped a couple of hours in which Mr. Clerk's appearance caused several very welcome bright moments. The witness branded as "absolutely false" the sworn statement of J. A. E. Bisaillon that it was Mr. Clerk who secured the photographing of two cheques, found in a customs house file and a source of considerable mystery to the committee.
