**EXCITEMENT HIGH OVER THE BIG GAME**

The Relative Merits of the Two Teams Freely Discussed To-day.

Fort William, March 19.—As a result of last night's three-to-three deadlock, the game on Saturday between Fort William and Kingston, winners of which will qualify to meet the western champions in the final series for the Memorial Trophy, emblematic of the Dominion Junior championship, will be a sudden-death one.

A sensational part of last night's contest was the wonderful return of Kingston in the third period, when the team had almost made ready to concede the game to Fort William by a decent margin. It showed that the visitors had something up their sleeve that could be relied upon to puzzle the home team.

To-day nothing is talked in hockey circles, but the relative merits of the teams and the chances for their next encounter. It is admitted that, if the Kingston boys can start out in the same form as that in which they ended on Thursday, they will take a lot of beating, but, on the other hand, it is believed that some sound coaching will assist in helping the Forts to maintain the advantage that they had in the first two periods last night. Where they seemed to fall down was in accepting their two-goal lead at the end of the second as enough and laying their plans to maintain it rather than increase it. It is realized that their best defence would have been an attack and that, if they play more aggressively to-morrow, they will stand a better chance of winning.

The weather remains cool and there is every prospect that ice will again be keen for Saturday's game.

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**TENTATIVE PLANS TO STOP SMUGGLING**

Announced in the House of Commons by the Minister of Customs.

Ottawa, March 19.—Tentative plans to stop smuggling into Canada were outlined in the House by Hon. G. H. Boulton when the estimates of his department were under consideration. While these arrangements were under his consideration, Mr. Boulton emphasized that it was his desire and intention to carry out whatever recommendations were made by the present customs enquiry committee.

The special preventive force, he declared, which had been authorized last year under an appropriation of \$350,000 was not operating satisfactorily. Forty men out of 87 now engaged would be dismissed and a force of approximately 260 men established. Fifty-six members appointed in advance, under provisions of a bill which was passed by the municipal committee of the Ontario Legislature to-day. The bill is general in scope, permitting any municipality to adopt the scheme.

**AUTOMOBILE CRASHED INTO STORE FRONT**

Car Went on to Sidewalk When the Tire Came Off.

About 12.30 o'clock on Friday morning, a car being driven along King street, by William Tallhurst, crashed into one of the large plate glass windows of the Halliday Electric Company, 345 King Street.

Mr. Tallhurst claims that one of his front tire came off, while he was driving on the icy pavement, throwing his car onto the sidewalk and into the window before he was able to right it.

The cost of the window is covered by insurance. The value of some lamps and other goods which were destroyed amounts to about \$50, otherwise there is no loss to the Halliday company.

**FEAR THAT SIX MEN LOST THEIR LIVES**

When Freight Train Left Rails—Missing Men Not Found.

Vancouver, B.C., March 19.—Fears that six men may have lost their lives when five or six cars of a C.P.R. east-bound freight train left the rails at Seacombe Lake late Wednesday night, was expressed by travellers who arrived here last night on passenger train that was held at the scene of the wreck for more than two hours Thursday. According to information brought here, the trainmen, who were on the scene, found one man lying half in the water at the foot of the rock and gravel fill, the sinking of which caused the derailment. Both his legs were broken. He told his rescuers, it was stated, that he was one of a party of eight men beating their way east on the cars. Search disclosed one of his companions, who was only slightly injured, but no trace was found of the other six. Neither of the two men rescued was able to give the names of the missing men. W. A. Rogers, address unknown, was the name of the man who suffered broken legs.

**DECISION WAS RESERVED.**

**TO CHARGE LAND OWNERS.**

With Cost of Affixing Numbers to Buildings.

Toronto, March 19.—The municipal committee of the legislature this morning reported a bill providing for an amendment to the Municipal Act to permit municipalities to charge owners of land with the cost of affixing numbers to buildings.

A bill moved by A. C. Lewis, which provides that municipalities shall contribute \$15 to "Last Post" fund when indigent returned soldiers are buried by that fund, was reported to the House.
