ICE VERY SOFT FOR THE GAME

The Time in Fort William Same as Here—Game to Start at Nine.

Special information to the British Whig received late Saturday morning contained the information that the second game of the Kingston-Fort William Memorial Cup series would start at nine o'clock to-night. This time is the same as the time in Kingston despite railway and telegraph schedules which show a difference of one hour. Therefore, the first scores should start to arrive any time after nine o'clock Kingston time.

The weather at Fort William was very mild to-day and the ice is in a soft condition. It was therefore decided to delay the game for one hour to give the ice a better chance to harden up a bit. The soft ice is decidedly favorable to Kingston in that the Fort William team is a light, fast team, specially adapted to hard ice while Kingston, being a heavier team, should be able to stand the hard going much better than their lighter opponents, who would be expected to wear down under the heavy going.
