FLUKE GOAL GAVE VARSITY A WIN

With Teams Tied, Moran of Ottawa Put Puck in His Own Net.

Ottawa, March 22.—After one of the most exciting struggles of the local hockey season, Toronto Varsity defeated Ottawa Gunners at the Auditorium Saturday night by 5 to 4 in the first game of the home and home series for the Eastern amateur hockey championship. The second and final game of the series will be played on Toronto ice tonight and the students have one goal margin to work on in the return engagement. Lady Luck laid a heavy hand on the chances of the local team and it was a fluke goal that gave the big blue team the margin on the evenings scoring. With the score deadlocked and three minutes to go, there was a face off inside Gunners' red line. Moran and Hudson both battled at the puck, Hudson missed, but Moran connected and in attempting to pass it back to his own men he eluded it straight into the Gunners' net, giving the Varsity team the odd goal in nine. The turn of fate was a bad blow to the Gunners who had met the famed "T" team stride for stride throughout the sixty minutes and at least deserved a tie on the night's play. Showing no respect for reputations the Shrapnels hopped right into the argument from the opening whistle and had the Blue's supporters considerably worried over the outcome before many minutes had passed, although before the game, the verdict was considered a "cinch" for Varsity and liberal odds were being quoted on the visitors.

HUNDREDS JOINED HOLY NAME SOCIETY

Men's Mission at St. Mary's Closes—Women's Mission This Week.

Hundreds were enrolled as members of the Holy Name Society at the closing exercises of the men's mission at St. Mary's Cathedral on Sunday afternoon, bringing the local membership of the society up to over a thousand now. The object of this society is to stamp out as far as possible irreverence to the name of Jesus and to put down cursing, swearing, blasphemy, perjury and foul talk. The object, therefore, is a most worthy one and following the mission, the new members took the pledge for the first time, the old members renewing the pledge along with them. The mission for the men came to a close at three o'clock in the afternoon, conducted by Rev. Father McMahon. In his closing sermon, Father McMahon urged the men on to perseverance and to hold to them the good that they had derived from the mission. He told them not to become discouraged but to persevere to the end. Perhaps the clearest and most concise sermon ever heard here on the subject of "Penance" was that preached on Sunday morning at the ten-thirty mass by Rev. Father McMahon. Every seat in the cathedral was occupied and there was the utmost attention as the speaker traced the origin of the sacrament from the time of its conception by Jesus Christ Himself right to today. Father McMahon made a clear explanation of Confession, which he described as the most difficult thing in the Catholic church for non-Catholics to understand. His sermon took in every phase of this most difficult subject and was the finest of its kind ever heard in St. Mary's.

The Women's Mission. The mission for the women of the parish commenced on Sunday night, Rev. Father Knox being the preacher on this occasion. The masses during this week are at 6 and 7.30 o'clock. The mass is general but a short fifteen minutes instruction is given to the women after each mass. At 7.30 at night the main sermon of the day is given. The women's mission will close next Sunday afternoon.

Michael J. Dolan. On Saturday evening, Michael J. Dolan, one of the oldest and most respected citizens of Kingston, passed away after a brief illness at the Hotel Dieu hospital. Mr. Dolan had been ailing for the past two weeks, but the end came as a great shock to the family, and the city-wide host of friends that Mr. Dolan made during his life-time associations in Kingston. He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. A. H. Boyle, of Toronto; two sons, Martin J., of Kingston, and Edward M., of Chicago; two sisters, Miss Libbie and Mrs. M. Connolly, of Montreal and one brother, Frank of Tacoma, D.C.

Mr. Dolan was a staunch Conservative and a member of St. Mary's congregation. During his seventy-five years, he had enjoyed perfect health until the end, and through his wide interests and exceptional personality, he was one of the best known and most popular residents of the city. With his passing goes one of the few remaining links with the past, and a character that reflected the best features of two generations of Kingston. The funeral will take place at 3.45 o'clock Tuesday morning from the home of his sister-in-law, Ellis street, to St. Mary's cathedral, where a solemn requiem mass will be sung for the repose of his soul.

David Johnson Moore, a well-known resident of this city, passed away on Sunday afternoon at his late residence, 10 Cherry street, in his sixty-ninth year. The deceased had lived in Kingston for the greater part of his life and was highly regarded. The funeral will take place on Tuesday afternoon to Cataract cemetery.

BUYS MALE BUFFALO FOR MAIN DUCKS FARM

Claude Cole is Asking the Dominion Government for Two Females. Claude Cole, Cape Vincent, who was in the city on Monday morning, announced that he had purchased a male buffalo from a circus and is sending it to his farm on the Main Ducks. Mr. Cole stated that at the present time he has two male buffaloes on the island. The two females died a short time ago. Mr. Cole has made application to the Dominion Government for two female buffaloes which he will place on the island.

At the present time there are about fifty or sixty red deer on the farm as well as three imported Virginia deer. Two moose, which were there for some time, died last year. In addition to wild animals, Mr. Cole is training about ten race horses, which he expects very shortly will be ready to be placed on the track.
