PORCUPINE WILL HAVE WORLD'S DEEPEST MINES

Lecture Given at Queen's on Saturday by Mr. C. W. Greenland.

Mr. C. W. Greenland, formerly of the Department of Mineralogy o Queen's University, now connected with prominent mining interests in Northern Ontario and Quebec, delivered a lecture before Queen's Mining and Metallurgical Society at 11 clock on Saturday. He discussed in some detail the process of deposition of the gold ores of several the large mines of the Porcupine district and outlined the essential features of the formation of commercial deposits. The reasons for the variations in the gold content of veins in the same area were very clearly presented.

Mr. Greenland stated that the depth to which mining could be carried at Porcupine depended only on prediction that within a comparahave the deepest mines in the world.
