

THE PRESBYTERIAL W.M.S. IN SESSION

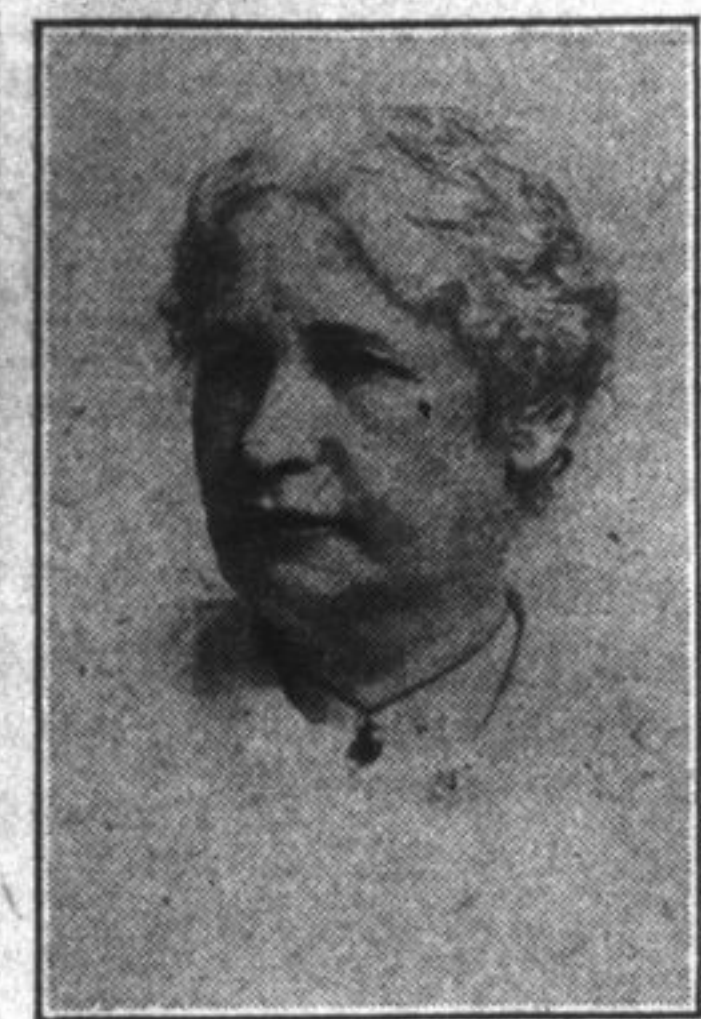
Interesting Reports Are Given Address by Miss Gunn of Toronto.

The opening session of the twelfth annual meeting of the Kingston Presbyterian W.M.S. of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, held in St. Andrew's church on Wednesday was most interesting and gave an indication of the interest of the women of that church have in missions.

The address of the afternoon was given by Mrs. McLean, Toronto, provincial vice-president, who spoke of the Home School at Englehart, Northern Ontario, for children who have to be sent from their own homes to be educated and which is being sustained by the W.M.S. who send linen, etc., as well as money for this useful work.

There are fourteen girls and one boy in the school, which is most efficiently run. Mrs. McLean also spoke of the hospital at Porcupine which is being kept open for the use of 6,000 miners until the government takes it over. This is also under the care of the W.M.S.

Mrs. Jenkins, Madoc, read the report of the Mission Band for which there are 17 branches, with a membership of 151.

They have this year raised \$223 for missions. The Home Helpers report was read by Mrs. G. A. Reid, Belleville, who reported 148 members and \$230 raised. Mrs. Reid urged all women to belong to this department.

Mrs. Fox, Allisonville, gave an interesting report on the amount of literature sent out, and Mrs. Mackintosh, Madoc, reported 338 subscribers to "Glad Tidings." The supply secretary, Mrs. Gotthard,

Trenton, reported a bale valued at \$67 sent to Englehart Hospital containing outfits for four boys and four girls and linen, etc., sent to the hospital at Porcupine.

Miss A. Fowler read the treasurer's report, which showed a total of \$2,063.85 received for missions. Mrs. T. Donnelly, Kingston, the corresponding secretary, reported 18 branches, a membership of 305, three senior life members and one junior life member and one memorial member made during the year.

The evening session began with music by St. Andrew's choir, in which Miss Elder, Dr. P. H. Macdonnell and Mr. Freeman Waugh took part, accompanied by Mrs. A. R. B. Williamson. Miss Elsie Williamson played a piano number which was greatly appreciated by the large gathering. Mrs. Campbell Strange read the scripture lesson and Mrs. Leishman the prayer, while the hymns which were heartily sung, were accompanied by Mrs. John Macdonald.

Mrs. H. R. Duff, who presided, read a letter from Mrs. D. Strachan, Toronto, urging that the matter of candidates for the mission field be kept in mind and that young women showing a desire for work in that field to be encouraged.

Mrs. W. S. McTavish, Belleville, the press secretary, spoke of the necessity of publicity and of the readiness of the papers to print reports of activities if sent in time to be news. She stressed the necessity of seeing that all names and initials be written plainly and correctly. She spoke of the splendid co-operation of the daily press, and said that the result of the publicity thus gained was not seen at first but brought fruit in time.

Miss Gunn, Toronto, who is in social service work among the Jews, was a delightful speaker, and told in an interesting way of her work. She appealed for sympathy with the Jews and reminded her hearers that we got the Bible from the Jews. God's ancient people, that Our Lord Himself was a Jew, that the promise of God to restore the Jews to Palestine was rapidly being fulfilled. She said there had never been such interest shown as at present in the Christian's belief that Jesus of Nazareth was the promised Messiah.

At the conclusion of Miss Gunn's address, after a hymn was sung, Mrs. H. F. Woodworth of Kobe, Japan, showed her beautiful colored slides of Japan and spoke in a delightfully interesting way of the country which has been her home for some years, where her husband is Dean of Literature in the college at Kobe.

The leading address of the morning was given by Miss Gunn of Toronto, who spoke on the work among the Jews, and gave many vivid illustrations of the good work carried on.

Reports were given by the secretaries of the general interest committee, the home helper committee, and by the strangers' secretary.

Resolutions were passed by the gathering tendering their hearty appreciation of the manner in which they had been entertained by the St. Andrew's Ladies' Auxiliary, Rev. Mr. Stephen and to the Mothers' Council and others who provided the lunches served at the meetings.

A very instructive feature of the gathering was the round table-conferences led by Mrs. MacLean. Mrs. W. E. Swaine was convener of the billings committee.

TALES OF POLITICAL PAST Recounted by Rt. Hon. G. P. Graham in Toronto.

Toronto, March 25.—At the Young Liberals' luncheon yesterday, the Rt. Hon. George P. Graham, in a witty speech, told anecdotes of his political life and partly lifted the veil from the politics of the last score of years. Of particular interest were his references to Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the reciprocity campaign.

He was introduced by W. E. N. Sinclair, the provincial Liberal leader, and in the audience were J. A. Pinard and the Hon. Thomas Low.

He assured Mr. Sinclair that he expected him to be some day premier of Ontario. "Things," said he, "will come out right in time, even if you have to do as they did in North York and get a lot of Liberals to establish summer homes."

"Tom Low and I," he declared, "are taking a well-earned rest and others term a well-deserved retirement. Some day we'll both be going strong again."

NEAR-SIDE STOP ON STREET RAILWAY LINE

Company Will Co-operate in a Movement to Prevent Accidents.

The Kingston Street Railway Company will on April 1st, adopt the near-side stop. That is the cars will stop before they get to a crossing instead of after passing the crossing as is now the case. The measure is to be introduced in an attempt to prevent accidents.

The near-side stop is in effect in a large number of Canadian cities, but in most of them it was not introduced as an accident preventative. In the city of Toronto for instance, at a great many crossings all traffic including street cars is stopped in order to allow the traffic on the intersecting street to pass. To save stopping again the passengers get on the cars at this stop.

The Kingston Street Railway Company is anxious that the new regulations will cause as little confusion as possible while the people are getting used to them.
