

NEAR-SIDE STOP ON STREET RAILWAY LINE

Movement to Prevent Accidents.

The Kingston Street Railway Company will on April 1st, adopt the near-side stop. That is the cars will stop before they get to a crossing instead of after passing the crossing as is now the case. The measure is to be introduced in an attempt to prevent accidents.

The near-side stop is in effect in a large number of Canadian cities. but in most of them it was not introduced as an accident preventative. In the city of Toronto for instance, at a great many crossing all traffic including street cars is stopped in order to allow the traffic on the intersecting street to pass. To save stopping again the passengers get on the cars at this stop.
