Easter at Y.M.C.A. A special Easter holiday programme will be arranged for the boys at the Y.M.C.A. A supper for the boys will be held by the Mothers Council on Wednesday of next week and other special features for the week are being planned.

Left for Orillia. Mr. Douglas Raney, who has been a member of the Whig reportorial staff for the past six months, left on Tuesday for Orillia, where he will take a position on the Orillia Packet. Mr. Raney, who is a son of Rev. W. H. Raney, pastor of Queen street Methodist church, has a wide circle of friends who will wish him every success in his new position.

Married at Newburgh. Percy Gerow and Miss Jessie Weese were quietly married at the parsonage on Wednesday last. The bride and groom are well known in the community and have a host of friends who extend congratulations. The bride received her education at Newburgh High School, and is a daughter of Stewart Weese. They will reside near Newburgh, on the Camden East road.

Y.M.C.A. Diamond Jubilee. The final supper in connection with the Y.M.C.A. Diamond Jubilee Campaign will be held at the "Y" Wednesday evening, when the final reports of the canvassers will be received. A number of new subscriptions have been received and some of the subscribers have increased their amounts. One well known lady of this city has financed the memberships for five boys, stating that she considered it the best investment that could be made.

To Establish Fox Ranch. With a view to establishing a fur ranch, J. L. Scoble has purchased a thirty-acre farm on the Perth road, about one mile from Smiths' Falls, and has already made arrangements

to have a house and pens built thereon. The two pair of registered silver black foxes with whom the business will be started will not arrive here until next November, but in the meantime, an extensive building programme will be followed out to prepare the property for fur farming.

A Dramatic Incident. On March 30th, 1874, one of the most dramatic incidents in the history of the Canadian Parliament took place. Louis Riel, who had led a rebellion in Manitoba in 1870, and had been declared an outlaw, had been elected as M.P. for Provencher at the general elections of 1873. He was told that if he went to Ottawa he would be arrested; yet he went and took the oath, afterwards making his way to Hull, where he remained for a few days. He never actually took his seat and was formally expelled from the House on April 6th, following.

Mission in St. George's. Rev. C. Ensor Sharp, Toronto, who held a mission in St. George's cathedral in 1922, is conducting the Holy Week services in the cathedral this week. On Monday evening the mission service was intensely devotional. The missionary spoke of the friends of Jesus Christ, the three close friends of the Lord, St. Peter, St. James and St. John, whom he chose to be with him in his hour of trial in the Garden of Gethsemane, and who slept during his agony. Christ said to us all, "Ye are my friends." To find out what Christ's friendship is to us and our friendship to Him, the missionary said, is the object of this Holy Week.

To Run a Continuing Church. That the continuing Presbyterians of Arnprior and vicinity will erect a new church has now been definitely decided. For some time the building committee has had several sites under consideration and negotiations were finally conducted last week when the property at the corner of McDonald and Daniel streets, commonly known as the Hartney block, was purchased by the church executive from Dr. A. A. Armstrong. The property, which comprises three large lots, offering ample accommodation for the church, manse and sheds, is centrally located and is an ideal site for the purpose. Alternative plans are now being prepared and it is anticipated that the contract for construction will be let this spring.

THE Y.M.C.A. MOTHERS' COUNCIL BANQUET

A Shower of Tea Towels Given—Interesting Addresses Made.

A most enjoyable event was held at the Y.M.C.A. last evening when the members of the Mothers' Council gathered around the supper table and listened to a number of bright speeches as well as taking part in the community singing, which was one of the events of the evening. A shower of tea towels was held in connection with the supper and a large number of towels were given by the ladies who attended.

Mrs. G. A. Bateman, who for nine years, has been president of the council, in her introductory remarks referred to the history of the Council and the objects for which it was organized. Many underprivileged boys have been helped to membership, the boys' rooms made more attractive and homelike, suppers provided, and help given to the boys' camp. Greatest harmony has prevailed among the members and a splendid co-operative spirit is in evidence. She mentioned the value of little things, little deeds of goodness which help to brighten life's pathway.

Secretary Harlow complimented the ladies upon their fine work and gave several instances where boys had been greatly helped because of the work of the Council.

Mr. Lilley, former Boys' Work secretary, who was also present, referred to the Council as his daughter, as he was the organizer of it. He spoke of the loyalty of the members to the organization and the work of the Boys' Department. Mrs. Leman A. Guild, convener of the committee, in a few chosen words, mentioned the objects of the gathering and the benefit to all in holding such an event. Mrs. F. Hambrook, another member of the committee, who has worked for the Association a number of years, referred to previous events of the kind and Mrs. George McCallum gave a reading, which was much appreciated.

A vote of thanks to the committee was moved by M. W. Harlow, and seconded by P. F. Brockel, for the sumptuous repast. The Mothers' Council is providing a supper for the members of the Boys' Division as part of the Easter holiday programme for the boys. A nominating committee to name new officers for the committee, was also appointed.
