THE FIRST EASTER MORN

St. John xx:1-20.

The first day of the week cometh
Mary Magdalene early, when it was
dark, unto the sepulchre, and seeth
the stone taken away from the
sepulchre.

Then she runneth and cometh to
Simon Peter and to the other dis-
ciple, whom Jesus loved, and saith
unto them, They have taken away
the Lord out of the sepulchre and
we know not where they have laid
him.

Peter therefore went forth, and
that other disciple and came to the
sepulchre.

So they ran both together; and
the other disciple did out run Peter,
and came first to the sepulchre.

And he, stooping down, and look-
ing in, saw the linen clothes lying;
yet went he not in.

Then cometh Simon Peter follow-
ing him, and went into the sepulchre
and seeth the linen clothes lie.

And the napkin that was about
his head, not lying with the linen
clothes, but wrapped together in a
place by itself.

Then went in also that other dis-
ciple, which came first to the sepul-
chre, and he saw, and believed.

For as yet they knew not the
Scripture, that He must rise again
from the dead.

Then the disciples went away
again unto their own home.

But Mary stood without at the
sepulchre weeping; and as she wept
she stooped down, and looked into
the sepulchre.

And seeth two angels in white,
sitting, the one at the head, and the
other at the feet, where the body
of Jesus had lain.

And they say unto her, Woman,
why weepest thou? She saith unto
them, Because they have taken away
my Lord, and I know not where they

turned herself back, and saw Jesus
standing, and knew not that it was
Jesus.

She, supposing Him to be the gar-
