There was a very large congregation in attendance.

Recalls a Similar Storm. G. B. Meadows, a former Kingstonian, now of Toronto, recalls a storm on April 1st, 1872, the equal of one of Wednesday and Thursday. On this particular April Fool's Day, more than half a century ago, he set out from Ottawa at noon on April 1, on the old Ottawa-Prescott Railway. At Prescott they were snowbound, and the passengers had to wait in the old station of that town during the whole night and the next day. It was midnight at the beginning of April 3 when they arrived at Kingston.
