HAM WITH PINEAPPLE

Something different in meat dishes. Try it!

Heat to the boiling point 2-3 cup of Syrup from Canned Pineapple. Add one teaspoon Cornstarch diluted with 2 table-spoons of water. Stir and boil one minute.
