A BUDGET OF NEWS FROM WELLINGTON

Building Operations at Brick Plant Nearing Completion - To Open in May.

Wellington, April 8.—Building operations at the new brick plant in Wellington are rapidly nearing completion. The machinery is being placed. The two large boilers are being bricked in with bricks manufactured at the Westlake plant, which were reserved for that purpose. The sand conveyor from the beach across the channel is almost complete. At the beach end of the conveyor, a sand pump will be used from a scow.

The management hope to have the plant in operation early in May with a maximum output of 44,000 bricks per ten hour day. Every care is being taken to make this one of the most up-to-date brick plants on this continent.
