**Vimy Dinner in Ottawa.**  
Friday marked the anniversary of the Battle of Vimy Ridge, the wonderful victory won by the Allied armies over a much stronger and veteran German army. There was no local celebration but a number of officers from Kingston left for Ottawa where they will attend the annual dinner in honor of Vimy Ridge.

**Gananoque Customs Collections.**  
The customs collections at the port of Gananoque, both for the month of March and for the year ending March 31st last, show a slight increase over the figures for the previous year. For the year they amounted to \$51,371.69, as compared with \$50,488.48 in 1925. In March last \$6,004.30 was collected, as against \$5,981.63 in March, 1925.

**The Y.M.C.A. Circus.**  
The side shows at the Y.M.C.A. circus were well patronized Thursday evening. "The Wild Man From Odessa" and the "White Lions" were two of the main attractions and drew much comment. **Sir Wilfrid Laurier Memorial.**  
The Sir Wilfrid Laurier Memorial Scholarship for proficiency in French conversation, is being competed for at Queen's University this year for the first time. The scholarship, which is valued at \$100 was founded by the Ontario Women's Liberal Association and can be awarded only to a Canadian-born English-speaking son or daughter of a British subject. It is open to students of all faculties, and the registrar, Dr. McNeil, is receiving applications at the present time.

**Meeting in Lansdowne.**  
The Lansdowne branch of the Leeds Farmers Co-operative Ltd. will hold two meetings in the town hall, Lansdowne, on Saturday. Co-operative marketing and other important and interesting subjects will be discussed under the able leadership of Mr. J. J. Morrison, Toronto, secretary for the U.F.O. Some of the other speakers will be Mr. F. H. Baker, of the Department of Agriculture, district poultry promoter, and Mr. E. F. Neff, Athens.
