MISS WHITTON SPEAKS IN SWITZERLAND.

A cablegram from Geneva, under recent date says, as follows: Canada is opposed to the draft convention concerning the repatriation of abandoned, neglected and delinquent children, which was presented for consideration to-day before the League of Nations Commission for the Protection of Women and Children.

Miss Charlotte Whitton, Canadian member of the commission, said its provisions would not be acceptable to Canada.

The convention provides for repatriation at the expense of the country of residence if a minor has lived there for more than five years, but at the expense of the country of origin if a minor has been in the new country less than five years.

Explaining that 80,000 children went to Canada from Great Britain in the last 40 years, Miss Whitton declared Canada believed the cost of repatriation and deportation of immigrants should be borne by transportation companies, not by governments.

The convention was referred to a sub-committee.
