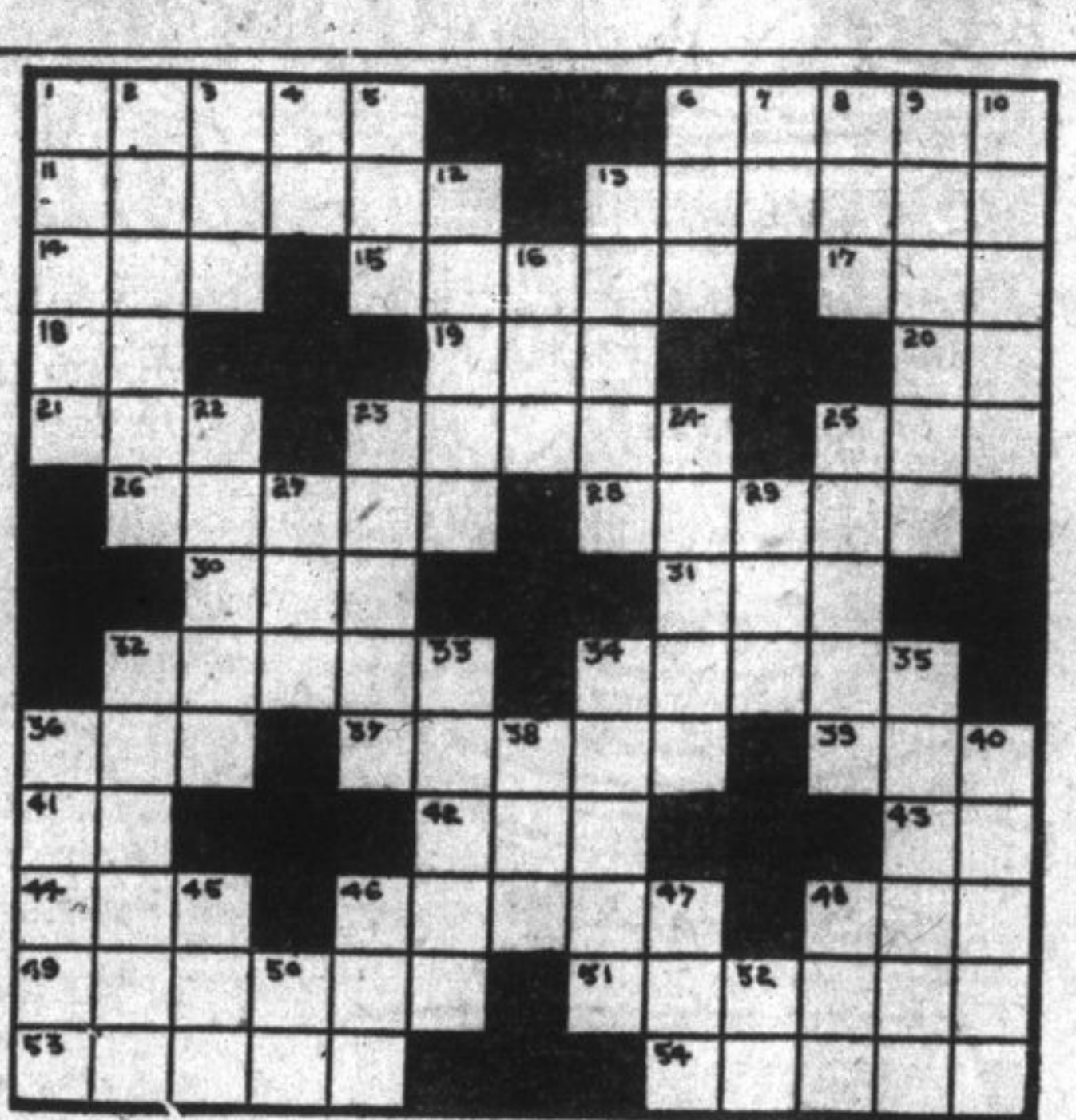

LATE REUBEN COOKE.

Died at Arundel, Que. -- Brother
Lives in Seely's Bay.
Reuben Cooke, a resident of Arun-
del, Que., for over sixty-seven years,
died at his home on April 2nd, after
ten weeks illness, at the age of
eighty-four.
Deceased was born in Hawkesbury,
Ont., on March 20th, 1842, the sec-
ond son of Corah Cooke and Euphe-
mia Black. His grandfather, Reuben
Cooke, after whom he was named,
came from Ticonderoga, N.Y., with
the United Empire Loyalists, and set-
tled in Chatham, Que., in 1807.
When four years of age Mr. Cooke
moved with his parents from Hawkes-
bury to Grenville, Que., and thirteen

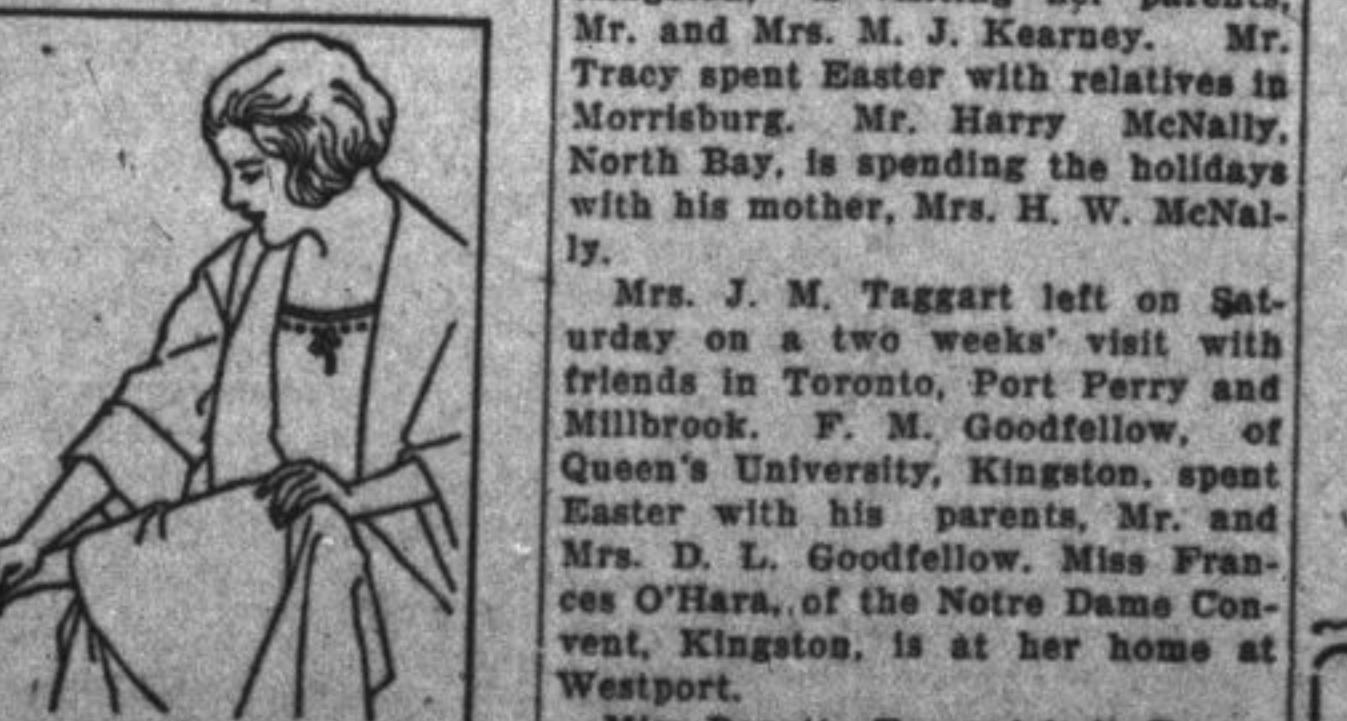
years later the family moved to
Arundel, where Mr. Cooke's father
had purchased 700 acres of heavily
wooded land, 300 acres of which
afterward became the possession of
the son. He heaved out, with all the
toll and hardship common to the
experience of the early pioneer in a
wooded land, a fine farm and home.
A man of remarkable energy and
endurance, possessing a fine physique
and strong personality, he was able
to accomplish an unusual amount of
work. Like his parents, he was an
active supporter of Methodism. As
a licensed local preacher, a Sunday
school superintendent, Bible class
teacher, leader of song and also as
school commissioner, municipal coun-
cillor, and mayor of the township for
many years, he led a life of great
activity and influence.
He was first married on March
15th, 1869, to Agnes Thomson.
There were four children born of
this union, three of whom survive,
the eldest, Margaret, having died in
infancy. Mr. Cooke was again be-
trayed by the death of his wife in
June, 1875.
On September 25th, 1877, he was
married to Mary, daughter of the
late Donald Lynam, of Beech
Ridge, Que., who, with one daughter
and six sons, survive.
The surviving family are the wid-
ow, two daughters and eight sons:
Mrs. Effie Campbell, at home; Wil-
liam S., on the old homestead; Ren-
den T., of Stanbridge East, Que.; G.
Frederick, T. Edmund and Delmer
L., of Grande Prairie, Alta.; Mrs.
(L. Rev.) C. F. Bowen, of Brockville;
Rev. H. Selwyn, of Seely's Bay; D.
Bertram and R. Raymond, of Grande
Prairie, Alta. Three brothers also
survive, John, of Beech Ridge, Que.;
Samuel and James, of Arundel, Que.
The funeral services were conducted
in the United Church at Arundel, on
Sunday, April 4th, by the pastor,
Rev. Mr. Hubley, and the remains
were laid to rest in the cemetery
nearby.
