It has been learned that Rev. S. F. Newton, a former pastor of the Athens Methodist Church, now of Lachine, fractured his right arm at the wrist while cranking his car near Douglas Church, Montreal.

Engagement Announced.
Mr. and Mrs. William Davison, Brockville, announce the engagement of their daughter, Irene, to Hilliard H. Webb, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Webb. The marriage is to take place the latter part of April.

Ministers Resign.
Rev. W. G. Bradford has resigned from the pastorate of Ashton United Church, and Rev. Ernest Codling from Carp United Church. Both these charges are in the Ottawa Presbytery. They were formerly in Kingston district.

Graham-Barr Wedding.
On April 7th the Rev. Rural Dean L. E. Davis, rector of St. Paul's Church, Brockville, officiated at the wedding of Miss Katherine Mary Barr, to George Graham, former C. N. R. conductor, both residents of Brockville.

Not Much Competition.
In 1926 Canada Steamships will have less Canadian competition to contend against than has been the case in previous seasons, owing to the requirement of additional boats that were formerly operated by separate organizations.

To Build a Platform.
H. C. Nickle, general manager of the street railway company, states that the city is to build a small platform at the corner of Elterbeck and union streets, which will make it more comfortable for passengers getting on and off the cars.

Fractured Left Hip.
Miss Teresa Merrick, aged about seventy years, Brockville, sustained a severe fracture of the left hip when she fell while walking in Daniel street. She was removed to St. Vincent de Paul hospital and is resting as well as can be expected considering her advanced age.

Channel is Now Clear.
At Prescott the ice in the St. Lawrence River broke away Saturday and floated down stream. Huge fields of ice blocked the channel opposite the town during the afternoon, but towards evening the channel was clear and open water visible many miles west.

Perth Suggestions.
The Perth Board of Trade is suggesting three things as part of this year's programme: the elevation of the C.P.R. station to the level of the tracks; the lowering of fire insurance rates in the town; and the erection of a new band-stand. The Board is also agitating a reduction in Hydro electric rates.

A Graduate of Queen's.
Mr. C. E. Little, Ogema, Sask., president of the Saskatchewan Trustees Association, was a fraternal delegate to the Ontario Trustees and Ratepayers Association, meeting in Toronto last week. He is a graduate of Queen's and enquired much about the University. He got his B.A. in 1914.

Case Before Grand Jury.
Gordon Simpson, one of the "Red" Ryan gang, who escaped from the penitentiary and was recaptured, will have his case considered by the grand jury at Toronto. He is charged with robbery with violence of the bank at Oakwood and St. Clair avenues, after the gang got away from Portsmouth.

Portsmouth Council.
The monthly meeting of the Portsmouth Council was held on Monday evening with a full attendance of members, and Reeve Michael J. Kennedy in the chair. Several bills were passed and plans made for future activities.

Boys in Trouble.
Six lads were lined up before Magistrate Farrell in the Juvenile Court on Tuesday morning, charged with breaking windows at the Standard Church. The case was remanded for a week and in the meantime, the youngsters will be called upon to make good the damage.

Many Seek Work.
Mayor Thomas Angrove has been besieged at his office every day for the past ten days, with an appeal for aid by men from outside places, who are out of work and who have been sent on to Kingston. Some of the men have been very thankful to receive a meal ticket they have been so hard up.

Have Resigned Charge.
Rev. W. H. Cramm and Rev. S. W. Boyd, associate ministers of Westboro United Church, have tendered their resignations to the congregation, to take effect June 30th, 1926. This is a natural sequence to the recent merging of the Westboro United Church and Carmen United Church, the former before Church Union a Presbyterian Church and the latter a Methodist Church. Rev. Mr. Cramm, a Queen's graduate, has been

minister of the Presbyterian congregation in Westboro for upwards of fourteen years. He will not be a candidate for the vacancy.

Had An Accident.
The horse driven by William Cole, Prince Edward county, shied at a C. P. R. train at Belleville and ran away, upsetting the occupants, going into a ditch close by the railway. Mr. Cole held possession of the reins and brought the horse to a stop. Mrs. Cole suffered a severely bruised nose and Mr. Cole a deep cut on the face which required several stitches to close.

A Miscellaneous Shower.
Mr. and Mrs. C. Quick, University avenue, gave a miscellaneous shower on Monday evening for Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Kennedy. After the presents were opened, a very enjoyable evening was spent in dancing, following which supper was served. Mr. and Mrs. Kennedy received many useful gifts from their host of friends.

Five Bass Daily.
Henceforth it will be illegal for fishermen in Ontario to take more than five bass in one day. This is a reduction from the previous legal catch of eight per day and was decided upon by the fish and game committee of the legislature, in an effort to conserve the fish of the province. The committee decided to make no change regarding the legal catch of lunge and pickerel.

Suffered From Amnesia.
Suffering from loss of memory after she had left her home to visit a friend who lives a few blocks away, Mrs. P. Rath, Brockville, aged seventy-two, was reported missing some hours afterwards, and after a search was found Saturday night lying in a ditch-hole on the North Augusta road three miles from town. The woman is in a hospital as a precautionary measure against pneumonia, as she is believed to have suffered from exposure.

To Hear Arden Cases.
County Magistrate Bradshaw will go to Arden to-morrow to hear three charges preferred against residents of that district. Dale Scott and Curtis Keller, two young men, charged with shooting out an electric street light and with discharging firearms within the municipal limits, will appear in two of the cases, and the other concerns a man who refused to make a statement of ownership of dogs when so requested by the assessors.

SPEND BIG SUM ON DELCO LIGHT PRODUCTS

Sloan, Jr., president of the General Motors Corporation, that General Motors is prepared to expend \$100,000,000 if necessary, in producing the products required to meet the demand of the selling organization.
