Some Ancient Vessels. On April 15th, 1814, there were launched at Kingston, two sloops of war—the "Prince Regent" and the "Princess Charlotte," with fifty-eight and forty-two guns respectively, the biggest vessels of their type on the great lakes during the war with the United States.

Successful Business Man Dead. Harper Willard, one of Prescott's pioneer residents, died on Monday after an illness of several weeks. The late Mr. Willard was born in Prescott, seventy-two years ago. He resided there all his life and was one of the town's most popular and prosperous citizens. For a number of years he was a prominent produce and grain merchant and at the death of his brother, Nelson Willard, took over the Willard hardware business, which he successfully conducted until he sold out and retired a number of years ago. He was a charter member of the Board of Trade and a member of Amity Lodge, I.O.O.F. In religion he was an Anglican.

Will of Late F. W. Sacket. The late F. W. Sacket, Cape Vincent, N. Y., left an estate of about \$250,000, and the income from his estate goes to his widow. After her death these bequests are made: St. John's Episcopal church of Cape Vincent, \$2,500; Cape Vincent Lodge, No. 293, F. & A. M., \$2,000; Riverside Cemetery Association of Cape Vincent, \$500 for maintenance of the family plot, and \$1,500 to Cape

Vincent American Legion Post. These bequests are payable out of the income of the estate. Miss Nellie Hartness, Cape Vincent, is left \$300 a year. The final disposition of the estate is to Frances Sacket Haigh, a niece, and her heirs.

THE HARBOR IS STILL IN THE GRIP OF ICE

The Steamer Wolfe Islander May Not Make Trip Till Next Week.

Open water was in evidence around the wharves in the harbor on Thursday morning, and it is predicted that the ice will be out within a few days. Capt. Grant Pyke with the tug Salvage Prince moved more steamers from the Collingwood Shipbuilding Company to the causeway. The steamer Pabjuna is now undergoing repairs in the Collingwood dry dock and it is expected that they will be completed about the end of this week. The boat will then be removed, and other steamers towed from the causeway to go into dock. The shipbuilding company is at present employing a large section of men in repairing the steamers. Capt. McDonald, of the steamer Wolfe Islander, stated on Thursday morning that the steamer will likely make her first trip of the season some time next week. The heavy repairs on the boat have been completed, and a large number of men are now engaged in painting the interior.
