Inspector J. Russell Stuart report ed as follows on the attendance in the public schools during March:

The enrolment at the end of the month was 2.717 or 13 more than last year. The total average daily attendance was 2,405, a failing off of 57. This is accounted for by sick ness, including a number of cases of

communicable disease. The report of Principal E. O. Sliter on the attendance at the Collegiate during March show the following:

Enrolment 743, average attendance 687. This is a decrease of 9 in enrolment and of 12 in average, as compared with 1925.
