Half a dozen disciples of champion old-time fiddlers met in competition at the Rideau Theatre, Smith's Falls, and Fred Eamer, Smith's Falls, was declared winner of the prize for the best performer, and upholds the honors for Lanark County as champion fiddler.

**Broke His Leg.**

**Funeral of Robert Weir.**  
The remains of the late Robert Weir, who died in Syracuse, N.Y., on April 16th, at the age of sixty-nine years, arrived here and the funeral took place on Monday afternoon from James Reid's undertaking parlors to Cataragui cemetery. Rev. J. W. Stephen of St. Andrew's church conducted the funeral service.

**Appreciate Work of Mrs. Lavell.**  
The executive of the Ottawa Presbyterian Women's Missionary Society of the United Church unanimously agreed to send a letter of appreciation to Mrs. Lavell and the members of the Dominion board for the successful manner in which the vast amount of organization work had been accomplished.

**Novel Suit Is Dismissed.**  
Justice Mowat has dismissed, with costs, the \$10,000 suit against the Public School trustees of S.S. No. 7, Westmeath, brought by Archibald Cameron on behalf of his daughter, Vera, for injury to her health, alleged to have been caused from breathing poisonous carbon monoxide gas, from soft coal, while attending school.

**May Extend Buildings.**  
It is understood that an appeal for funds is to be made by the House of Providence in the near future for the purpose of extending buildings from the present point on Ordinance street to the corner of Sydenham street. It is understood that the work of extending the buildings will be commenced as soon as sufficient funds have been secured to warrant a start being made on the work.

**Called to Montreal.**  
Rev. J. J. Monds, formerly minister of St. Andrew's Church, Carleton Place, for many years, has received a call to a Montreal charge. The Cote des Neiges and Mount Royal Vale congregations have been formed into one pastoral charge and a call has been extended to Mr. Monds to become their minister. For the past few years he has had the Presbyterian charge at Petrolia, Ont.

**Teacher Resigns.**  
Mr. S. R. Balkwell, teacher in the Gananoque High School, has tendered his resignation, to take effect on June 30th. It has been reluctantly accepted, as he was regarded as an excellent teacher, his work highly commended. Mr. Balkwell will attend Queen's University for one year in order to complete his academic course and, better his professional qualifications.

**Kirkpatrick's Store Window.**  
The window of Kirkpatrick's Art and Flower Shop Princess Street, has attracted a great deal of attention from passers-by. Beautiful flowers of all kinds fill the window, while a miniature telegraph system is also

on display. The idea is to bring out that flowers can be delivered by telegram to any place and the best service guaranteed. The window decoration is a novel one and has been much admired.

**Passing Forged Cheques.**  
A man registering in one of the Renfrew hotels as G. E. Mansfield, Montreal, contracted with a Renfrew citizen to make him a number of boxes and gave a cheque for \$75 in advance made out upon a bank in Winnipeg. A wire to Winnipeg brought word that there were "no funds." Meanwhile "Mansfield," having got the Renfrewite's signature to something in the nature of a receipt, forged a cheque for \$50, using the Renfrewite's name, and one of the local banks cashed the cheque. The police are now looking for the forger, who is known to have Charles D. Thomas as an alias.

**Sea Cadets at Church.**  
Led by the band of the local Sea Cadets Corps, and in command of Scoutmaster Percy Hall, the Kingston troupe of the Boy Scouts, at full strength, paraded from the market square Sunday morning to attend the service at St. James' Church. The cadets were met at the church by the Portsmouth troupe, who joined the parade. Rev. T. W. Savary delivered a very interesting and highly instructive sermon on "A True Scout." The speaker dealt with the life and service of the Boy Scouts and of the valuable work being accomplished by the organization. The cadets paraded back to their hall after the service.

**To Visit Toronto.**  
Referring to the visit of the R.C. H.A. at Toronto, on May 19th, the Toronto Star of Saturday has the following:

"The committee in charge of arrangements is distinctly pleased that this unit is to be able to provide part of the spectacular programme which it proposes to put on. The musical drive which these young artillerymen carry out is said to offer many thrills. It was also stated that the Gentlemen Cadets of the Royal Military College, Kingston, will again visit the city and take part in the big event. With these will be the various local regiments and cadet corps from Bishop Ridley College, Upper Canada and other boys' colleges."

**The Late Mrs. Spooner.**  
The funeral of the late Mrs. Isobel Helen Louise Scott, widow of the late Reuben Spooner, Glenburnie, took place Saturday afternoon from the residence of her son-in-law, Dr. G. W. Bell, 450 Princess street, to Cataragui cemetery. The services were conducted by the Rev. Mr. Raney of Queen street United Church, and Rev. Dr. Brown of Sydenham street United Church. Miss Nesbitt and Mrs. Crawford of the Queen street church choir, assisted by Mr. Eva, sang most feelingly the two favorite hymns of the deceased, "I Shall Know Him," and "Safe in the Arms of Jesus." The floral tokens were many and beautiful. The remains were placed in the vault to await interment later.

**Evangelist Chapman's Message.**  
"The ten commandments are God's law, and should be kept by God's people to-day, the same as they were kept in the day of Moses," declared Evangelist Chapman last night, speaking on "God's law not being taught in the pulpits to-day." He said in part: "When one of the commandments states plainly that the seventh day is the Sabbath, an easy way to keep from obeying is to declare that the law has been done away with. How can we go on, knowing it to be true and deliberately violate God's express command? Do you have any satisfaction in doing that? Are you content to do it? What is the way out? There is only one way and that is to obey God."
