A meeting of the Y's Men's Club was held at the Y.M.C.A. on Monday evening, Mrs. C. C. Wyatt presiding. There was considerable discussion on the minstrel show to be held by the club and plans and arrangements were approved.

Removes to Ottawa.
G. M. Dallyn, in charge of the Forestry office at Tweed for a number of years, has accepted an important position as assistant manager of the Canadian Forestry Association at Ottawa. He will enter on his new duties in a short time. Tweed will lose two good citizens in Mr. and Mrs. Dallyn.

Forty Hours' Devotion.
The Forty Hours' devotion will be held in the chapel of the Hotel Dieu Hospital this week, commencing at eight o'clock on Wednesday morning and concluding with solemn benediction on Friday night at eight o'clock. High mass will be celebrated on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday mornings.

They Did Not Elope.
Joseph E. Mohan, formerly of Odessa, and Miss Mary G. Murray, formerly of Sydenham, were married in Watertown, N.Y., on Saturday. It was said the couple had eloped but this was not so. They had gone to visit friends while awaiting baptismal certificates from their old homes. The couple will live at Niagara Falls, N.Y.

Racing Circuit Formed.
A racing circuit which will be known as the Eastern Ontario Short Ship Circuit, has been formed, and arrangements made to offer a \$500 stake for 2.30 horses at each meet, together with a list of class races. The races will be held at Perth, Arnprior, Renfrew, Smith's Falls, Brockville, Ottawa, Russell, Morrisburg, Winchester, Mountain and Alexandria.

Both were Guilty.
Bert Scott and Mrs. Bessie Wright, Alexandria Bay, N.Y., are charged with illegal possession of liquor in violation of the Volstead act. Scott was placed under \$5,000 bail, and Mrs. Wright under \$1,000. Both went to jail. Mrs. Wright expects to have her bail raised soon. Scott takes blame for possession of the liquor found, but the authorities held that both were guilty.

The Eye Is All Right.
Mr. W. M. Lee, Tweed, received an injury to his left eye which caused him pain and anxiety for a few days. A piece of tin struck the eye, and on examination it was thought the particle had lodged in the eye. Mr. Lee went to Ottawa and consulted a specialist. X-ray treatments were required to decide the conditions of the injury. No particles had entered the eye.

Off for Overseas Trip.
Dr. H. A. Boyce and Ald. Edward Anderson left at noon today for New York from which port they will sail for Cherbourg, thence to Paris and Vienna. Dr. Boyce intends spending the time in study, this being the fourth trip he has made to Europe for this purpose, having previously studied in London and in 1923 in Vienna. It is possible that Mr. Anderson will visit Ireland, the home of his ancestors, while he is away. The travellers will return about August 1st.

Death of J. H. Thrall.
Jason Howard Thrall, a veteran of the American civil war and for half a century a jeweller at Almonte, died April 15th at Ottawa, at the age of eighty-four years. He became ill only the evening before. Born at Poole's Landing, near Brockville, he was the son of the late Thomas Thrall and Caroline Howard of United Empire Loyalist descent. Left to mourn are two daughters, Mrs. M. W. Ferris, New York, and Miss Ida M. Thrall, Ottawa, and one sister, Mrs. William Field, Lanark.

The Bard of Loch Fyne.
At the centish of the Gaelic Society, Toronto, on Saturday evening, an address on Evan MacColl, the well-known Kingston poet, was given by Dr. Alexander Fraser, MacColl was born in 1808 in Argyllshire, and his poetic efforts, while still quite young, won him the warm friendships of such men as Sir Walter Scott, Hugh Miller, Christopher North, and the Blackwood Circle, and his residence in London before coming out

to Canada enabled him to meet many of the literary men of the day in the capital. The bard charished through life reminiscences of those eminent men with some of whom he maintained a most interesting correspondence.

PROF. C. F. GUMMER ASSISTED DIRECTOR

And Accompanist of Kingston Choral Society—Has Had Wide Experience.

Prof. Cuthbert F. Gummer, Ph.D., has been appointed as accompanist and also as assistant director of the Kingston Choral Society. This society has been very fortunate in having had among its office-bearers from the beginning a musician so accomplished and so versatile as Dr. Gummer. He was formerly conductor of the Queen's University Choral Society. It was under his leadership that the joint choirs of the uniting churches sang so admirably last June at the service in Grant Hall, which inaugurated the union. Dr. Gummer was one of those who co-operated with Mrs. A. R. B. Williamson in founding the Kingston Choral Society. He has from the beginning thrown himself heartily into its work and the success which has attended this society has been in no small measure due to his efforts. He has been twice vice-president and three times president, while in other directions he has done much valuable executive work. On many occasions he has with great acceptance acted as accompanist and he shows equal efficiency in wielding the conductor's baton on any occasion when Capt. Light is unable to be present, while he would be a welcome addition to the orchestra if he could be spared from the chorus or the piano stool. Since 1924 Dr. Gummer has been convener of the art and public lectures committee of Queen's University.

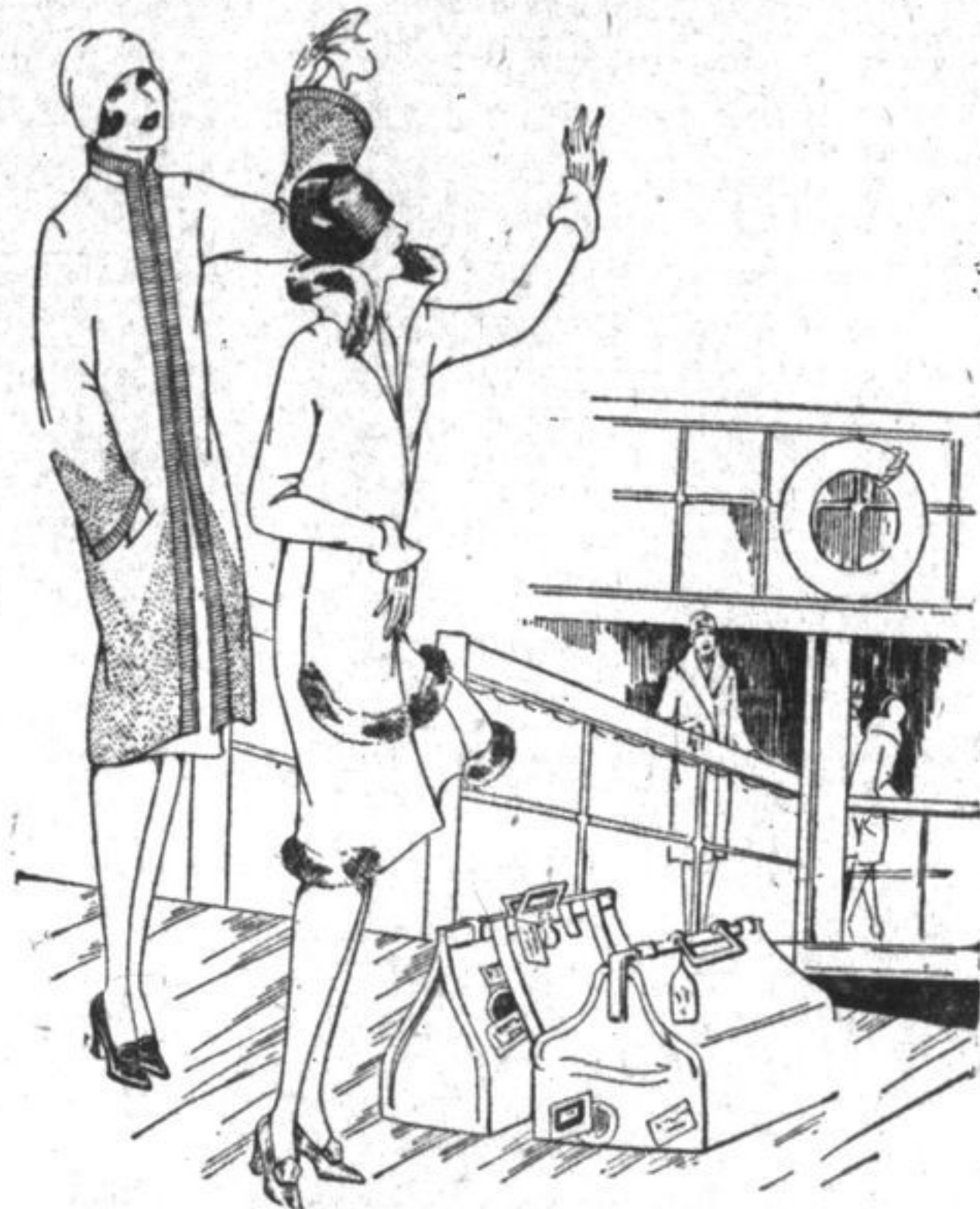
