Bishop Urges Synod To Recruit for Ministry

Montreal, April 22.—Urgent needs for the Diocese of Montreal, in the opinion of Bishop J. C. Farthing, are more lay readers, additional recruits for the ministry and generous response to an appeal for an endowment of at least \$200,000 for the Diocesan College. These factors for progress in the work of the church the bishop emphasized in his official charge to the synod at the opening of the sixty-seventh annual session.

"I hope this synod will consider the need, and will take steps to make a sympathetic effort to recruit for the ministry," said the bishop.

Cut Renfrew Tax Rates.

Renfrew, April 22.—This year's tax rate, struck last night, shows 44 mills for Public School supporters and 47 mills for Separate School supporters. This is a reduction of 2 1-2 mills off Public School and 3 mills off Separate School.

TO REDUCE INSURANCE

On the Buildings at Sir Oliver Mowat Sanatorium.

The Kingston Health Association held its monthly meeting in the Board of Trade Rooms on Wednesday. The March report was made. The operating costs were \$8,658, the revenue received was \$9809.49. There are \$15,600 in outstanding account, of this \$7,429 is due from the D.S.C.R. \$1,061 from the Ontario Government. About \$4,000 from Municipalities and \$2,433 from civilian patients. Legal action was authorized in several cases of non-payment by municipalities. Accounts to the value of \$2,842.77 were ordered paid.

The defalcations of the late accountant J. E. Harte, now total \$1,728.97 and extend back for about 12 months. At the end of March there were seventy-nine D.S.C.R. patients and twenty-six civilian patients in the sanatorium. To date there are four or five additional ones entered. The clinic costs from October to date were \$190. Fifteen patients were secured thereby. The directors ordered the paying down of the insurance carried from \$150,000 to \$100,000. The superintendent reported a quiet month with everything going on in effective order.
