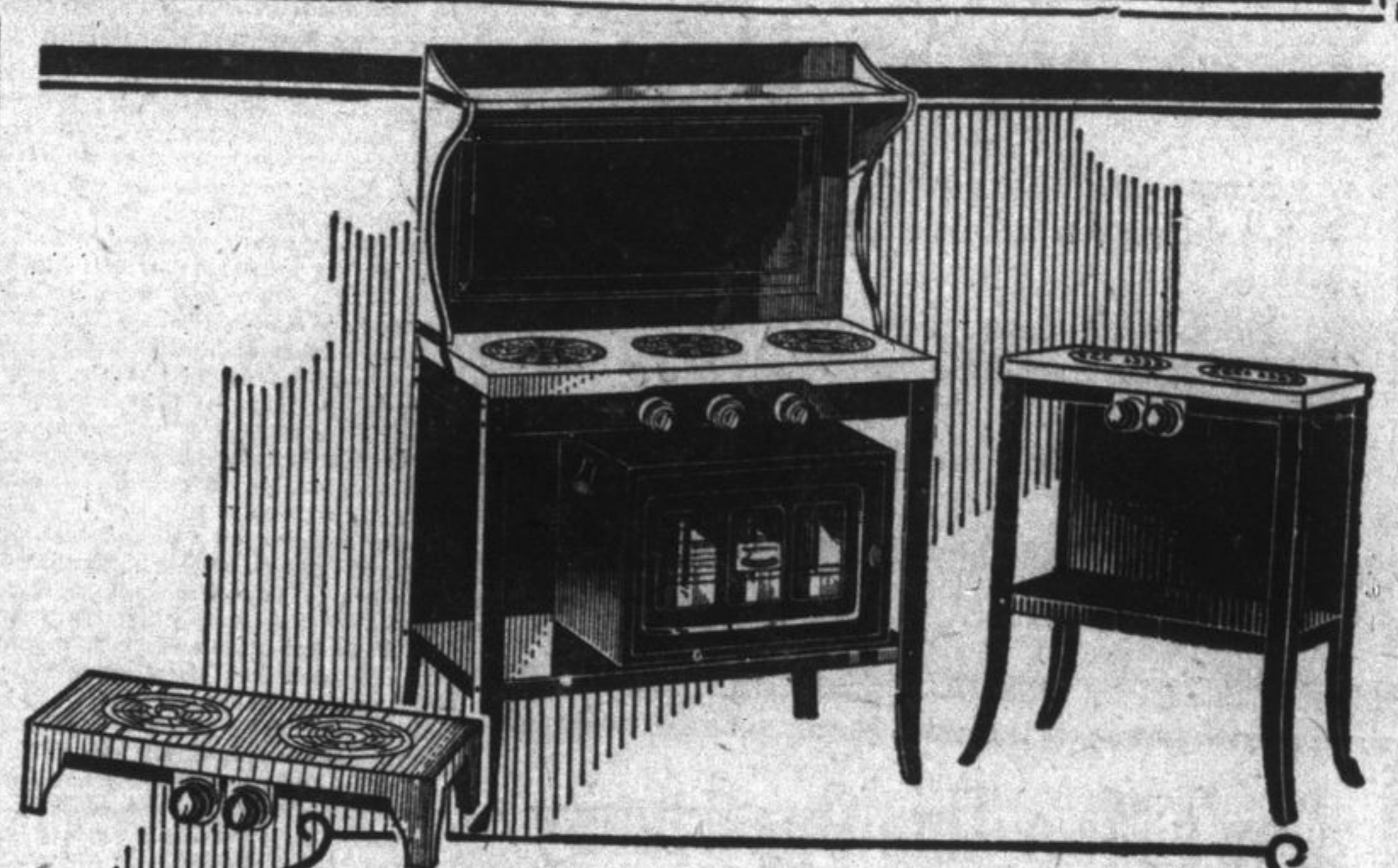
THE APRIL MEETING OF WOMEN'S COUNCIL

should be made by the council, through the affiliated societies, to induce Canadians to use home-grown fruits and vegetables. In a short discussion it was suggested that a speaker from the Department of Agriculture be sent from Toronto to bring the matter before the council and the societies and to give expert information on the matter. Judge Harkness, Winnipeg, was introduced and spoke at length on the subject of Juvenile Courts. These courts, which depend for their existence on the Juvenile Delinquent Act passed in 1908, must have a sympathetic judge, a detention house and an investigator and probation officer. Such courts are rare courts of law, but with the object of not only finding out that the delinquent is guilty of misdemeanor but for finding out why. The restoration of the children and youths brought before the judge and the bringing them up to be useful citizens is the reason for such courts, which, given adequate machinery are successful.
