MR. J. B. WALKER, K.O. RE-ELECTED BENCHER
Kingston's Veteran Lawyer. Returned for a Term of Five Years.

Mr. J. B. Walker, K.C., the nominee of the Kingston Bar, has been elected a Bencher of the Law Society of Upper Canada, in the recent election. Thirty-nine were elected, but nine of these men become life members, having been elected for three terms of five years each. This leaves the number of elected Benchers at thirty.
Mr. Walker was elected by the Board of Benchers in 1923 to complete the term of the late Crown Attorney John L. Whiting, Hon. W. F. Nickle was first appointed in Mr. Whiting's place, but when he entered the Government, he resigned, and Mr. Walker was appointed. At the election just concluded, Mr. Walker was elected for a term of five years.

GOVERNMENT WILL STAND BY ITS GUNS

Premier King Tells Great Motor Delegation Assembled in Theatre.

Ottawa, April 23.—When the great deputation which came to Ottawa this morning to protest to the Government against the tariff changes as applied to motor cars, was meeting in a local theatre just before noon to organize the advance on Parliament Hill, Premier King and Hon. J. A. Robb, Minister of Finance, unexpectedly appeared on the stage. The Premier explained that he had come to welcome the delegates, and to find out the size of the delegation. The railway committee room, in which the meeting would be held, he said, would hold only 500, so he advised that representatives selected to attend be ready with all their arguments. The Government would stand to its guns, so far as he was concerned, the Premier said, in referring to the proposed tariff changes. The statement started up a roar and shouts of "so will we stand by our guns."
The ministers soon left and the deputation continued with organization work.

BRITONS TO PRESS CIVIL WAR CLAIMS

Chamber of Commerce Asks U.S. Government to Help Obtain Hearing.

London, April 23.—The Association of British Chambers of Commerce yesterday adopted a resolution requesting the United States Government to assist in obtaining a hearing before the Supreme Court for British subjects having claims, said to total about \$75,000,000, against eight of the southern states for moneys loaned prior to the end of the Civil War.

BIRTH RATE DROPPING.

Average Now Is 20.5 Per Thousand, as Against 25.8 in 1921.
Ottawa, April 23.—Canada's birth rate continues to fall. In October, 1925, the last month of record, returns from all the provinces except Quebec show a total of 11,887 births in Canada, compared with 12,768 in October, 1924. The equivalent annual birth rate per thousand of population in the eight provinces was 20.5, having decreased steadily since October, 1921, when it was 25.3. Vital statistics for Quebec are not available.

American Waiting List.

Washington, April 23.—Application for licenses for twenty new broadcasting stations have been filed with the department of commerce since April 1st. The total now on the waiting list is understood to be approximately 550, for the first time a greater number than there are stations in operation in the United States today. Ten of the new applications are for a chain of stations that would extend over the entire country.

Divorce Bills Are Ready.
Ottawa, April 23.—Sixty-six divorce bills were given first reading in the House of Commons yesterday and referred to the Commons committee on private bills. They had all passed the Senate.

Can Smoke In Bed.
New York, April 23.—In a domestic case Magistrate Folwell upheld the right of a husband to smoke in bed.
