Treasurer Souvenir.
The British Whig has received a souvenir from Miss E. Crawford of Sarnia, Ontario, in the shape of a New Year's address, printed at The British Whig office in 1846 on pink satin. It is in the form of a poem and is headed "New Year's Address of Black Jack O' The British Whig to his Kingston Patrons, Kingston January 1st, 1846." It told a very interesting story. The Whig ap-

preciates Miss Crawford's kindness and intends to have this souvenir framed and hung in the office.

The deceased lady was born in Gananoque on May 9th, 1847, and lived there until about eighteen years ago, when she moved with her daughter and grandchildren to Buffalo.

Mr. Grass was driving up from Ontario street and, not seeing the street car, drove the nose of his automobile under the front vestibule. Fortunately no one was injured.

A Postal Lecture.
A very instructive and educational talk was given to the children of Robert Meek school on Friday afternoon by W. T. Harkness who delivered an illustrated lecture on the workings of the local post office and postal service in general. Mr. Harkness dealt with the different phases of postal business in a thorough manner and showed a complete knowledge of his subject. About three hundred and fifty attended the lecture.

No Special Event at Military College.

ICE OUT OF HARBOR.
Some Vessels Are Expected to Clear on Monday.

The ice was all cleared out of Kingston harbor on Saturday morning, but reports from ports down the river and up the lake show that the conditions are not so good for navigation.

It is expected that some of the steamers, which have wintered in the Kingston harbor this winter, will clear on Monday. Millan Brothers, marine provisioners, were filling the order for the steamer Wahcondah on Saturday.

The steamer Susie Chipman will undergo repairs shortly in preparation for sailing.

The lighter Cobourg, of the Donnelly Wrecking and Salvage Company will enter the Davis dry dock on Monday for repairs.

The Family Market Basket
The fine weather of Saturday was responsible for the largest market of the season, and there were large quantities of all kinds of farm products. Potatoes, which have been hitting the high spots in prices this spring, were selling at \$4 to \$4.50 a bag, with a very few at \$3.75 a bag. Maple syrup sold at \$2 per gallon, and maple sugar, which was scarce, at thirty cents a pound. Eggs sold for 33c to 35c per dozen and butter dropped from the price last week, 42 cents a pound, to 40 cents, the decrease being mainly due to the fact that the farmers from Wolfe Island were able to attend the market with large quantities. Meat and vegetable prices remained the same as last week.
