

THE BUSY RABBITS GNAWED THE TREES

Damage Done to the Orchards
on the Wolfe Island
Farms.

Wolfe Island, April 23.—William Allison, Jr., has purchased the Grant Grimshaw farm from Grant Pyke, also the fifty acres at the point. The rabbits have played havoc with the apple orchards this winter; owing to the deep snow they have eaten up into the centre of the trees. Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Deir spent Saturday in Kingston. Miss Theima Moore returned to her home in Gan-

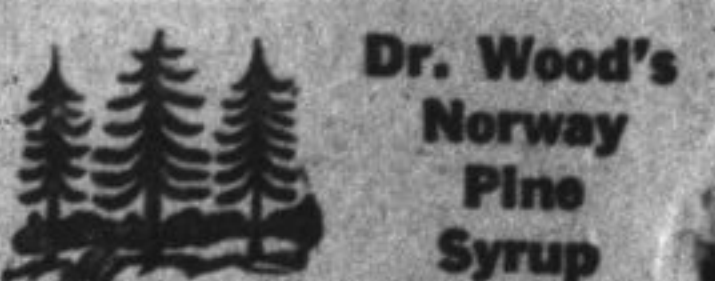
