KINGSTON IS NOT TO GET POWER

(Continued from Page 1.) something definite to give to the public about power.
"Yes, we should come out flat-footed about it," put in Commissioner Harris.
Commissioner Campbell stated further that if the power could not be secured the public should be notified that there was no more power for industries.
"I think we had better get in touch with Toronto and see what can be done," remarked the chairman.
"They seem to be passing the buck," said Commissioner Harris.
"No, I think they are too big for that," said the chairman.
The chairman also stated that plans were on foot to bring another power line along the St. Lawrence and that no doubt Kingston would share in this line.
Commissioner Campbell stated that Kingston could be served from the Trent, providing the power was diverted from Oshawa towards Kingston, when the Quebec power was used for western points.
After some further discussion, it was decided to get in touch with the Hydro powers at Toronto, regarding another conference, to ascertain what can be done for Kingston.

That Quebec Contract.
It will be recalled that on April 15th Premier Ferguson announced that, upon the recommendation of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission, the Government had authorized the completion of an agreement for the delivery to Ontario by the Gattineau Power Company, at the Ontario-Quebec boundary, in the vicinity of Ottawa, of 230,000 to 260,000 horsepower of hydro-electric energy, at a price of \$15 per horsepower.
Delivery would commence with a block of 80,000 horsepower in 1928, total delivery to be completed by 1931. The contract binding the delivery is for 30 years, dating from 1928.

The Gattineau Power Company, from which the new block has been secured, is a subsidiary of the International Paper Company, which is at the present time constructing power plants on the Ottawa River, at Chelsea, and Farmer's Point, from which developments certain amounts of power will be delivered under the above-mentioned contract. They also contemplate developing at Pagan and other points on the Ottawa, including storage on the Gattineau and its tributaries.
The chairman, R. N. F. McFarlane, presided at the meeting, and also present were Mayor Aggrove and Commissioners J. M. Campbell, James Halliday and James Harris.

Henry York, Plevna, Loses House by Fire—Railway Line Flooded.
Plevna, April 26.—Friday morning, April 23rd, the house of Henry York, three miles west of the town, was burned to the ground. Mr. York is a bachelor and has lived alone for many years. Case in Toronto Court

Re Oddfellows' Relief Association and McKenna—W. M. Nickle (Kingston) for the Association, moved for leave to pay insurance money into Court. W. Proudfoot, for E. Haggart, and Infant, C. D. M. Haggart, L. Ramsay for Infant, W. M. Haggart, P. E. Ault, for J. Anderson. Judgment: No change of beneficiary having been made and it having been stated in the certificate that the moneys were payable to assured's wife, who was therein designated by name; and the wife so designated by name not being the wife living at the maturity of the contract, the moneys on death of assured became payable in accordance with the statutes then in force. The release signed by Jennie Anderson is not a bar to her right to claim as beneficiary under her mother's will. The moneys derivable from the certificate do not form part of R. H. McKenna's estate, and were not and are not subject to his debts. It is not to the estate that Jennie Anderson looks for payment of part of these insurance moneys, but to the Association, and her release, which was given for a different purpose, does not deprive her of the right as devisee under her mother's will to receive that part of the insurance moneys which her mother would receive if she were living. The Association, after deducting thereout its costs fixed at \$25, will pay the moneys accordingly, the shares of any infant or infants to be paid into Court. Costs of Official Guardian fixed at \$10 and of Jennie Anderson are to be paid by Ethelwyn Haggart.
