QUEEN STREET CHURCH HOLDS ITS ANNUAL

Substantial Balance Reported by Treasurer—Rev. Mr. Raney's Splendid Work.

The annual congregational meeting of Queen street United church was held on Monday night when reports of the different societies were presented. Reports were received from the Mission Band, the Limestone Trail Rangers, Girl Guides, Mission Circle, Epworth League, Sunday School, Woman's Missionary Society, Ladies' Aid, Choir Guild, District Visitors, Class 27, Adult Bible Class, Ladies' Guild, Treasurer, Maintenance and Extension Fund.

A very successful year in the Sunday school, of which Dr. C. C. Nash is superintendent, was reported. All other branches as well showed a splendid increase in finances. The report of the treasurer, given by Chief James Armstrong, showed all accounts paid to date with a substantial balance on hand. The reports from all quarters showed around \$12,000 raised in the eleven months, this year closing one month earlier on account of union.

Misses Nesbitt and Belch gave an excellent piano duet during the evening and the male quartette, composed of Messrs. A. E. Middleton, V. Fraser, J. W. McCallum and Harold Allen, rendered several numbers which were appreciated.

The balloting for representatives to the following being elected: L. E. Mason, W. H. Warren, George Smith, James Armstrong, Mrs. H. A. Lavell, W. H. Wormwith, George McCallum, E. L. Martin, M. McDonald and W. L. Williams.

A vote of thanks to the heads of the different departments was moved by Judge H. A. Lavell, particularly to Rev. Mr. Raney for the splendid work he had done. The motion was seconded by Robert Crawford, and unanimously adopted.

During the nominations very dainty refreshments were served and a social time was enjoyed.

MINISTER AND DEPUTY CHARGED BY DUNCAN

With Receiving Liquor They Knew Was Shipped From Government Warehouse.

Ottawa, April 27.—The confidential report of Inspector Walter Duncan, which has been before the customs probe for some weeks, was made public this morning. Chairman Mercier announced at the outset of this morning's proceedings that the committee had decided unanimously that the report be read.

The report states that evidence taken by Inspector Duncan shows that Hon. Jacques Bureau, ex-Minister of Customs and Excise; R. R. Farrow, Deputy Minister, and M. J. Larochelle, member of the Civil Service Commission, "received liquor that they knew was being shipped from the Government warehouse in the province of Quebec, city of Montreal," also that they contravened the Canada Temperance Act and the Ontario Temperance Act in transporting liquor through the province of Quebec into Ontario.

The report includes a complaint from H. Provencher to the Deputy Minister of Customs that R. P. Clerk, Inspector of Customs of the port of Montreal, was "shipping out of the province of Quebec a large quantity of liquor through M. F. Wilson, chief preventive officer, to Hon. Jacques Bureau, former Minister of Customs, R. R. Farrow, Deputy Minister of Customs, and M. J. Larochelle, member of the Civil Service Commission."

The evidence discloses, Inspector Duncan states, that R. P. Clerk has received wholesale quantities of liquor from the customs house for a number of years and large quantities of sugar and molasses.

It reveals, says Inspector Duncan, that Inspector Clerk used a smuggled and stolen car and illegally removed the tires from the car under seizure that had been sold by tender to H. Provencher.

J. E. A. Bisillon, former chief preventive officer at Montreal, figures in the report at length. Eleven alleged offences are enumerated against him.

LAKE NAVIGATION.

Preparations Being Made For Opening May 1.

Fort William, May 27.—Preparations are being made here for the opening of navigation, which will not, it is expected, be delayed after May 1st.

As far as conditions here are concerned, boats could move out any moment. The ice-breaker, James Whalen, yesterday ran up the Kaministiquia River as far as the Grand Trunk bridge, and the river ice is now loose. The ice fields in the bay have been broken by the recent winds, and for a time yesterday the bay was clear of ice. But a change in the wind brought it all back in front of the harbors. The field is loose and will not take long to disintegrate and float away.

Already the lighthouse keepers are getting ready, and the Whalen will take six of them out today to begin their summer vigil at lights along the north shore. But, until the ice at the 500 is broken up, no vessels are expected to clear from here.

EVANGELINE BOOTH.

Is Taken Seriously Ill in New York Hotel.

New York, April 27.—Evangeline Booth, national commander of the Salvation Army, was in an hotel here today seriously ill with an acute attack of appendicitis, having returned from Chicago in a special car.

Slapped Teacher's Face.

Jersey City, N.J., April 27.—Miss Margaret Detler, Public School teacher, is suing Mrs. Palma Vesper, widowed mother of 11 children, for \$10,000, because Mrs. Vesper is alleged to have invaded the school room and slapped the teacher's face for punishing her boy.

HIGHWAY IS UNDER TWO FEET OF WATER

Ottawa, April 27.—Country roads leading from this city suffered heavily from the recent cent. floods. The road to Montreal has been washed out at Rockland, while flood waters at Lombardy on the Kingston highway have also caused considerable damage. The Prescott highway is under two feet of water for about five miles in the vicinity of North Gower.

Items From Tweed.

Tweed, April 26.—Mrs. B. F. Fisher was taken to Peterboro Hospital, and is in a critical condition. John L. Newton, reserve of Hungerford, has been seriously ill for some time. Mr. J. M. Tufts, Belleville, has taken a position in C. F. Fawcett's hardware. "The Little Clodhoppers" given in the Auditorium by the A.Y.P.A. of St. James' church, was a decided success. Mrs. Charles Thompson, Queensboro, is visiting friends here.

FATHER LAY DEAD ON KITCHEN FLOOR

And Little Girl Told Playmates She Could Not Attend Party.

Windsor, April 27.—Ten-year-old Mary Besoten, 1527 Elmere avenue, last night, was unable to attend a neighborhood party because, she told playmates, her father was dead and she had to stay at home with her seven-year-old brother.

Neighbors notified police, who found the dead on the kitchen floor of his home. Pneumonia was given as the cause of death by the attending physician, who told authorities that the father had refused to enter a hospital.

Consignment of Arms Suspected for Ireland

London, April 27.—Customs officers detained a passenger aboard the Adriatic on arrival at Queenstown from New York. According to Cork despatch, this passenger is alleged to have had in his possession a number of documents directed to prominent members of the Republican party and containing references to a consignment of arms and ammunition for Ireland from the United States. The passenger also is stated to have had a large sum of money on him.
