

Since women have been partly enfranchised, Mrs. Drummond has separated herself from all political parties and has devoted herself to the organization of The Women's outs and fights the influence of Communism upon labor.

She represents a modern type Paris. In addition to her law work, and her efforts for suffrage, she is the mother of a nine-year old son.

Mme. Kraemer-Bach discussed the question of the requested admission of the National Woman's Party of the United States to membership in the International Suffrage Alliance. Under the present constitution the application must be refused, she explained, because only one organization from each country is eligible. That organization now is the League of Woman Voters in the United States. She believes that the majority of the congress will oppose a change in the Constitution permitting additional memberships.




