KINGSTON TENNIS CLUB HAS BEEN GRANTED A CHARTER THIS YEAR

Tenders to be Called for Construction of Five Cement Courts—Club House to be Built—Membership Now 150.

The time is not far distant when the Kingston Tennis Club will have a home of its own similar to the Catoran Golf and Country Club, J. C. Reynolds, solicitor for the Kingston Tennis Club has applied for a charter and the same has been granted.

A general meeting of the members of the club has been called for Wednesday evening when matters of general importance will be considered. It was announced on Thursday that negotiations are now under way for the purpose of suitable grounds for the building of new courts. Tenders will be called in the very near future for the construction of five cement courts, which will be built and ready for use not later than June 1st.

It has been decided that when the new land is purchased temporary club houses will be built for use this year. In 1927 an up-to-date club house will be constructed and ready for occupation for that year. For the past few years the grounds at the old Queen's Athletic campus has been used and were held under lease. At the present time members of the club are busy selling bonds and are meeting with very favorable success.

A BY-LAW A BY-LAW

to grant a fixed assessment to the Monarch Battery Company, of the City of Kingston.

1. The assessment of the property of the Monarch Battery Company, of the land, buildings and business assets, shall be fixed at One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000).

2. This fixed assessment shall not be for a longer period than two years, and shall not apply to or affect taxation for school purposes or local improvements.

3. The fixed assessment shall be confined to the property of the Monarch Battery Company, Ltd., a corporation existing on and proposing to carry on within the Municipality of the City of Kingston certain manufacturing business, and during only such period or part thereof as the property including the land and premises heretofore described are so used for manufacturing purposes and no other property being described as part of jobs 235, 236 and 239 on the westerly side of Montreal Street, and bounded by Montreal, Joseph and Frank Streets.

CHANGES IN RUGBY RECALL MEMORIES

Old Queen's Stars Practised Place Kick for Hours.

The Montreal Star says: The abolition of the place-kick in Canadian rugby has created much talk and the consensus of opinion is that it is a pity it has gone.

Many seem to think that the game is becoming more and more monotonous all the time. One man recalled how spectators used to watch for penalties that would give some player a free place-kick.

Another one spoke of the times when the place-kick was considered so important and attractive a feature that men would practice it for hours. In those days only four points were given for a touch-down and two for a conversion.

Another enthusiast remembers "Chick" McRae of Queen's—they always seem to have had a "Chick" there—as the place-kicker par excellence. He used to practise with a pebble holding the ball while lying on the ground for at least half an hour before the game started and people used to come early to enjoy the sight.

Stuart Raeside was on that team, and Dr. A. E. Ross, Federal Conservative member for Kingston. And Guy Curtis was captain and centre half and his language used to get so lurid in times of stress that the Rev. Principal Grant who then ruled Queen's used to admonishingly shake his good hand at him, for he only had one.
