**Queen's Endowment Fund.**  
Queen's University endowment fund at Toronto, has spurred to the \$94,230, mark, gaining a sum of \$6,000 in additional contributions collected by the ten teams engaged in the financial drive in the city, which commenced its campaign on Monday.

**The Late Margaret Williamson.**  
The funeral of the late Margaret Williamson took place from her late residence, 250 Barrie street on Thursday afternoon to Cataract cemetery. The pall-bearers were John Evans, William Friendship, John Derry, James Williamson, James Donoghue and Thomas Clugston.

**A Former Tweed Resident.**  
Mrs. William White, aged ninety-four years, died in Toronto, on Wednesday. She was a former resident of Tweed, where her husband was engaged in the hardware business, and was also prominent in local affairs and a leading Orangeman. He predeceased the late Mrs. White some fifteen years ago.

**Making Store Alterations.**  
The firm of Abramsky & Sons are making some alterations to their store with a view to providing more accommodation for their customers. The office, which formerly occupied a central position in the store, is being moved to the back, and the space will be utilized for the display of goods.

**Electricians Organize.**  
The electricians of Kingston have been organized by Mr. John Noble, Canadian organizer of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, and in the near future it is proposed to submit to the contractors an agreement on working conditions, which it is hoped will have the approval of both contractors and workers.

**Passing of John Alva Carr.**  
John Alva Carr, a resident of Belleville for the past thirty years, died on Monday after an illness of short duration. The late Mr. Carr was born in Prince Edward county in 1848. He represented as agent the Frost and Wood Machinery Co. at Belleville. A member of the Anglican Church, Mr. Carr leaves his wife, and one brother, Tobias Carr. Interment was made in Picton.

**Goes to Renfrew.**  
John W. Payne has resigned his position as assistant superintendent of the Campbellford Cloth Company's mill and will go to Renfrew to become superintendent of the two mills owned by Senator O'Brien of which S. J. Moore, formerly superintendent of the Campbellford mills was recently appointed. Mrs. Payne will remain in Campbellford for the present.

**Death of Mrs. John Morris.**  
The death of Mrs. John Morris occurred at her home in Augusta at nine o'clock on April 18th. Death was due to heart trouble from which she suffered for seven weeks. She was seventy-nine years of age, the daughter of Thomas and Eliza Ferguson, pioneer settlers. She was twice married first to James Morris, who died fifty years ago and then to John Morris. Six children survive.

**Church Folks Going to Town.**  
At the W.M.S. of the Presbyterian Church in Canada held in Toronto, Mrs. John Stewart, Appleton, in her report for Lanark and Renfrew, stated that the church union had been the means of wiping out many of the rural churches, not only Presbyterian, but also other denominations. "More and more people are going to church in the towns and the rural churches will soon be a thing of the past."

**Coming to Kingston.**  
The Watertown Chamber of Commerce, the service clubs and other organizations of that stirring city contemplate visiting Kingston in June to the number of 250 or more and are asking the Board of Trade here for particulars as to what pastimes could be arranged. It would be a big friendly company to meet with Kingston's citizens. The local board has appointed a committee to work out details for the enjoyment of the visitors.
