The Trustees now ask graduates and friends, and friends of education generally, to assist in raising a substantial endowment which will ensure better salaries and enable this great college to play its rightful part in the further development of Canada. The glorious past of Queen's justifies the bellef that the fund will be cheerfully and promptly raised.
