PLAYERS CHARGED IN NAPANEE COURT

Odessa Says Had Game on Street—Windshield of Auto Broken.

An aftermath of a game of baseball played on the street in the village of Odessa, a week ago last Saturday, was heard in court at Napanee on Thursday, when four young ball tossers, of Odessa, which by the way is noted for its baseball talent, were charged with "unlawfully breaking a windshield." In an automobile owned by Thomas Woodcock, of Napanee, R.R. No. 1. A number of boys were playing ball on the street, when Mr. Woodcock drove his car through the village, and it is alleged that the ball bounced against the windshield and smashed the glass.

The hearing of the case created a great deal of interest. It is stated that upwards of fifty or sixty residents of Odessa went to Napanee for the trial.

W. S. Herrington, K.C., of Napanee, appeared on behalf of the ball players and U. M. Wilson, crown attorney, conducted the prosecution. After hearing the evidence the magistrate dismissed the case.

VANCOUVER'S FAREWELL

To Dean Craig, Now Rector of St. George's, Kingston.

The congregation of Christ Church, Vancouver, expressed its appreciation of the work of Rev. W. Craig, D.D., and Mrs. Craig, at a farewell reception tendered them Thursday evening, April 15th. Various organizations united in presenting Dr. Craig with a gold watch, suitably inscribed, and Mrs. Craig with a silver coffee set. Sunday School teachers also presented a Bible, in which they had inscribed their names. The Easter offering, of a very generous nature, was also presented to the rector.

Archdeacon Heathcote, who spoke in place of Archbishop dePencier, told of the value of Dr. Craig's work to the diocese. Rev. H. R. Trampour paid tribute to his teaching ability and to the excellent service rendered to the colleges and at the meetings of the clericus. A letter was read from Principal Vance, who was unable to be present.

Dr. A. P. Proctor, on behalf of the congregation, expressed sincere appreciation of the pulpit and pastoral work of Dr. Craig and referred to his high spiritual teachings.

A social hour was spent, when all present were given an opportunity to meet Dr. and Mrs. Craig and members of their family.

Dr. Craig left the following Wednesday for Kingston, to assume the duties as rector of St. George's Cathedral and Dean of Ontario.

QUEEN'S ENDOWMENT

(Toronto Globe)
Kingston has two great educational institutions, the Royal Military College and Queen's University. The former is conducted by the Dominion Government, more especially for its one purpose of training men in military science. The latter is independent, and for three generations it has taken a leading place in advancing Canadian scholarship, in equipping zealous young men and women for work in education, the ministry, industry, and the various learned professions. Queen's has been fortunate in the calibre of its leaders, and to-day thousands of its graduates in many parts of the world remember their student days with gratitude and pride.

Pressure of other burdens has made it necessary for the Ontario Government to advise the Trustees of Queen's to make an independent appeal for an endowment fund. The university, as Principal R. Bruce Taylor says, "existed and flourished by practicing the high discipline of doing without things." The time has come, however, when economy becomes a fault rather than a virtue, for in five years seventeen teachers above the grade of lecturer have left to better their financial positions.

The Trustees now ask graduates and friends, and friends of education generally, to assist in raising a substantial endowment which will ensure better salaries and enable this great college to play its rightful part in the further development of Canada. The glorious past of Queen's justifies the belief that the fund will be cheerfully and promptly raised.
