POSSE MAKES SEARCH FOR MISSING WARDEN

Clarke Russell of Bancroft Disappeared on Monday-Wolves Plentiful.

Belleville, May 7 .- Missing since Monday afternoon when he went out on a tour of inspection, the disarpearance of Clarke Russell, game and fisheries inspector, with headquarters at the village of Bancroft, is causing great anxiety to friends and relatives.

Inspector Russell went out presumably without supplies of kind as is his custom. He left the home of E. Vardy, . near Bancroft, promising to return the same even ing to spend the night, after which he intended to take a companion with him, purposing to head Egan Creek, about twelve miles south of Bancroft. This section of the country is very densely wooded and wolves are frequently seen about by trappers and heard at night by the scattering of farmers in that dis-

As the hours were on and Inspector Russell failed to return, residents of the vicinity became very anxious for his welfare, so much so that yesterday, the fourth day of his absence, a posse of twenty, headed of by Constable McCoy, set out at an early hour.

Constable Russell is a married man, the father of four children, and the anxiety has naturaly increased to a high pitch, especially in the fact that shots have been heard in the section in which he disappeared. Mrs. Russell, however, has every confidence that her husband is detained by some minor matter or by business of inspection.

THE AVERAGE WAGE OF BRITISH COAL MINERS

\$12 a Week-Locomotive Engineers Get \$24 and Motormen \$15.

London, May 7 .- That the coal miners are among the lowest paid industrial workers in Great Britain is apparent from an examination of the latest statistics published by the Trades Union Congress. These cover half of the year 1925, and the official publication states that they apply only to certain grades, and do James Chisamore of Larue Island not cover the entire industries.

According to these figures the maximum possible weekly earnings W. This was the average for the whole of Great Britain, but there was a considerable divergence in the rates in different areas. All other areas referred to in the statistics were equally subject to divergence, higher rates being paid in London and some other big cities than in small towns and country

The paper declares that one of these Governments must go. "We are not going to see J. H. Thomas and Ramsay MacDonald imitating the work of Lenin and Trotsky. here." The Daily Mail says of the Labor leaders. "Nor will the British people—which is entirely differeent from the pathetic, submissive mujiks of Russia-submit to such an odious tyranny."

Wife of British Premier Organizes Auto Service

London, May 7-Mrs. Stanley Baldwin, wife of the British Premier, has plunged into the national struggle to keep up transportation by organizing a special fleet of automobiles to bring business women and girls from the subarbs to London. From her headquarters, at No. 10 Downing street, Mrs. Baldwin and a staff of volunteer women workers have recruited private motors of all kinds for this service.

Ontario Has Much Helium.
