Sydney, N.S.W., May 6.—(By the Canadian Press Australian Correspondent): The question of how the great self-governing British Dominions should enter the field of international politics has exercised many of the ablest minds in the Dominions. Should the Foreign Office in London formulate the policy for the whole of the Empire, unaided by Dominion statesmen? Or should the Dominions take an active part?

be sent to London for the purpose of assisting in the solution of problems of foreign affairs met sometimes with expressions of contempt. There were, however, despite this attitude, very urgent matters in relation to foreign affairs, which affected intimately the well-being of Australia and we were not going to solve this problem of our relationship to foreign affairs by refusing to admit that it existed and by receiving with contempt any suggestions that might be made for the solution.

Australia's attempts to deal with her own local problems, urgent and important as many of them were, were not as significant in the life of the nation as the reactions of Australia to foreign affairs. It was international affairs which affected the very existence of a nation. The very existence of Australia, for example, as a democratic, self-governing community, was at stake during the war. Our very destiny, our fate, our chance of dealing with internal affairs, were all bound up with what happened in international affairs.

Supposing Great Britain went to war in pursuance of her obligations, it was a matter for Australia, while legally at war, to consider whether she should participate actively in that war. Mr. Latham said that the dire forebodings, therefore, of those who saw in the Locarno Pact the breaking-up of the Empire were quite unfounded. The position to-day was the same as it had been. If the Empire was at war, we were at war; but it depended upon ourselves what part, if any, we would take in belligerent operations.
