AT THE CAPITAL

Situation Created by Two- shovelling on side walk; \$90, Frank cent Postage to Be Reviewed.

Ottawa, May 7 .-- Answering yesterday, respecting compensation for rural postmasters after the troduction of the two cent stamp on July 1st, Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Minister of Justice, made the following statement:

"It is realized that the adoption of the 2c letter rate on the 1st of July next will result in a substantial decrease in the revenue of rural post offices. As rural postmasters are paid on a commission basis, there would be a corresponding decrease in their salaries, unless their rates of compensation are increased.

As postmasters' salaries are based on the revenue of the previous year, 2c postage would not affect their salaries in any event until 1927. In the interval, the question of an upward revision of the rates of compensation of rural postmasters will receive sympathetic consideration by those who are charged with the duty of fixing the rates."

SWITCHMAN RUNS AMUCK AT GUELPH

Shoots Stanley Burns in Abdomen and Fires at Another

Guelph, May 7 .- Charles Roberts switchman on the Canadian National Railways, who has been acting strangely, ran amuck with two revolvers last night and tried to kill Stanley Burns, also of the C.N.R. staff, against whom he had a fancied grievance. Entering Burns' house about 11 o'clock. Roberts yelled: "Now I have you," and began shoot. One bullet struck Burns in the lower abdomen and plowed way into the thigh. Apparently the demented man then headed for the switch house where he met another employee named Craig, at whom he fired three shots, none taking effect. 
