New Steamer Named After Kingston Makes First Trip Up With Freight.

Lepine of Montreal in command and Mr. M. J. O'Brien of Kingston as chief engineer. The steamer unloaded considerable package freight and then cleared for Toronto and Hamilton.

There were no ceremonies on her arrival, it having been decided to make the presentation of the flags from the city at a later date. The City of Kingston will be engaged this season in the shipping of package freight between Montreal and Hamilton.
