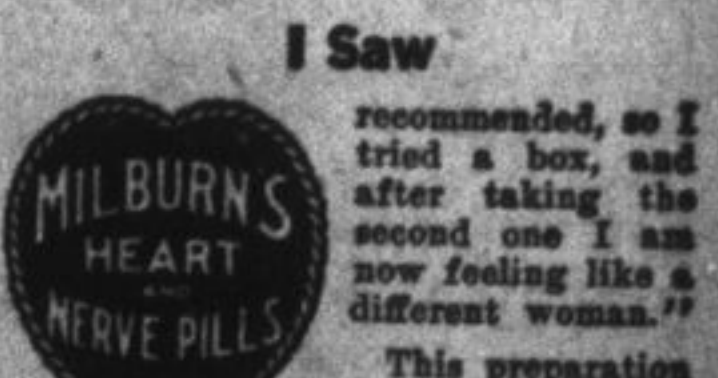
GANANOQUE RESIDENT DEAD AT AGE OF 94

The Late Michael O'Connor, Brother of Charles J. O'Connor of Kingston.

Gananoque, May 8.—One of Gananoque's grand old men passed away yesterday morning shortly after seven o'clock in the person of Michael O'Connor, at the ripe old age of ninety-four years, he having celebrated his birthday on April 29th. Had it not been for a fall which dislocated his hip there was no reason to believe that he would not have lived a century. Mr. O'Connor was born at Long Point, and for several years taught school at Toledo; coming to Gananoque he was with the firm of R. P. Colton for a number of years and afterwards with the Cowan & Britton Company until he retired about twenty years ago. Surviving are four sons, T. D., merchant, Gananoque; W. J., Fort William; Charles, Watertown, N.Y.; Michael and Frank, Gananoque (the two latter, with whom the deceased has made his home since the death of his wife some years ago); two daughters, Mrs. Warren Mongell, Sylvan Beach, N.Y., and Mrs. Howard Ellis, Syracuse. One brother, Charles J., Kingston, also survives, as well as five sisters, Miss Ellen O'Connor, Mrs. William McDonald, Gananoque; Mrs. B. Flood, Kingston; Mrs. Henry Palmer, Napanee, N.Y.; Mrs. Desmond, Potsdam, N.Y. The funeral will take place Monday morning from the residence of his son Frank, King street east, at nine o'clock, at St. John's Church, where a requiem mass will be chanted for the repose of his soul, after which interment will be made in St. John's cemetery.
