That the Kingston branch of the Ontario Division of the Red Cross is, as advertised in the "Coming Events" column on this page, planning to hold the annual membership drive. The peace time work of the Red Cross is a wonderful thing, in its way as wonderful as its war work. Most of the societies that were fostered by the war ceased work when the excitement of war was over but the Red Cross works on faithfully not only for returned men but for all in need of help and comfort.

Outpost hospitals in Northern Ontario where the settlers, many of them returned men, are miles from medical assistance, have been built and furnished, one at Whitby recently receiving furniture from the Kingston branch, and now the news comes that a small hospital is being opened in Bancroft, where patients in need of trained assistance can be treated. To follow up, to carry on when the excitement is over and the big subscriptions fall off, is the task the Red Cross has set itself to do and is doing nobly.

That a drive into the country will show you that even eight or ten miles from the lake the maples are covered with red blossoms and there is a decided thickening of the misty darkness of the woods. WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

ELGIN. The Elgin Women's Institute held its annual meeting for receiving of reports and election of officers on Thursday, May 6th, in the community hall. There was an attendance of twenty-nine. The meeting opened with singing of "The Maple Leaf" after which the minutes of the April meeting were read and approved.

The correspondence included an invitation from the Chaffey's Locks branch to unite with them in a joint meeting at Chaffey's on June 3rd. An appeal was presented from the Armenian Relief Association of Canada, and the usual contribution of ten dollars was voted for this cause. A resolution was carried to assist the caretaker of the hall, George Yardley, to the extent of five dollars for the purchasing of nails for a new house he is erecting. It was also decided to remember one of the sick members, Mrs. M. Moore, who is in the hospital in Kingston, with a pot of flowers.

The meeting to be addressed by the government delegate, Miss Robson of Denfield is to be held on June 17th, and the subject chosen for the address was, "Efficiency After Forty." There was some community singing, and the roll call was answered by the payment of dues, twenty-seven members being enrolled for the coming year.

Miss E. A. Halladay, as one of the delegates to the Athens Agricultural Conference was called upon next for her report. Following this the reports of the secretary, treasurer and librarian were given. The statistical report stated that 12 regular meetings with an average 725 were held, and one special meeting with an attendance of 80. The financial report showed the total receipts for the year as being \$595.75, and the expenditure \$496.07, leaving a balance on hand of \$446.12.
